Lumley Suspended Four Games And Fined \$50

GLACE BAY, N. S. (CP) — Johnny Lumley, Glace Bay Miners' high-scoring forward, has been suspended four games and fined \$50 for clubbing another Maritime Major Hockey League player with his stick.

League President C. Roy MacDonald said Thursday night that Lumley's suspension, for hitting Sydney Millionaires' Ted O'Connor in a game at Sydney Tuesday, is effective immediately.

Six stitches were required to close the gash made by his stick. The blow-up occurred after O'Connor snared the puck away from Lumley in the game's closing minutes.

Sydney won the game 4-2.

Detroit Red Wings In 5-0 Shutout Over Boston

DETROIT, (AP) — Ted Lindsay fired a pair of goals that started Detroit Red Wings off to a 5-0 victory over Boston Bruins for Terry Sawchuk's ninth shutout of the National Hockey League season Thursday night.

The shutout total is the most for any National Hockey League goalie. Sawchuk did it by stopping 32 Boston shots.

Lindsay got a first-period goal while the Bruins were short-handed by cashing Gordie Howe's goal-mouth pass. The Detroit captain made it 2-0 early in the second period.

Glen Skov added his 11th by deflecting Marcel Pronovost's long shot and Red Kelly drove in his 15th and first in 18 games as the Bruins increased its margin to 4-0 after 11:16 of the middle period.

Johnny Wilson contributed the other counter, his 12th, late in the game by ramming home his own rebound.

Howe also picked up an assist on Goldhamer's goal. It was his third point of the game and hoisted his total to 57 points, tops in the NHL.

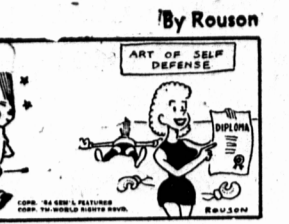

MONTREAL, (CP) — Montreal's Catholic school commission has reported a deficit of \$2,518,486 for 1953. Revenues totalled \$20,571,000 and expenditures \$23,090,474. The report, presented to the commissioners by chairman Eugene Dubois, Tuesday estimated it cost the commission \$152 to educate each of its 110,000 pupils.
