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leaving the agricultural industry to the benefit of themselves and to the net gain of the remaining farm community and the national economy. Age and other factors indicate some farmers perhaps about 40 years of age or less. The level of public school education for farm children, especially in Quebec, is well low. Quebec youngsters leaving farms in recent years have had less than 10 years of schooling in other provinces in the survey area 30 years ago. FARMS NON-ECONOMIC I found many farms hopelessly non-economic in size. A key observation is that about 20 per cent of the total value of what is a commercial farm. The 1961 census, listing 483,000 farms, listed non-commercial farms as those earning less than \$1,200 annually. There were about 130,000 such farms in 1961. The report suggests raising the minimum level for defining a commercial farm to \$2,000 annually and "if this done, a much larger part of the agricultural policy is by implication redefined as a problem of national economic development."

"The massive task of reclamation and re-employment of the human and physical resources on the non-viable farms requires expensively financed and costly educational, regional, resource, market and industrial development policies; complementary adjustments in provincial standards of education and extension on the one hand and federal efforts in technical and vocational training on the other; and further adjustments in agricultural policies and agricultural rehabilitation and development programs."

"It says the most significant contribution of ARDA for depressed areas will be to help them move to other activities. The report was prepared by two W.I.A. policy economists, Ralph Hedlin and Merrill Menzies, who formerly was a federal farm specialist."

Depressed Area Farmers Ruled Better Off Land By ARCH MacKENZIE OTTAWA (CP)—Perhaps half the farmers in depressed areas of eastern agriculture could have the land with benefits of themselves and the economy, suggests a survey conducted for the federal government in 1963. "Not only are the poorer farms of today the rural slums of tomorrow but, as the source of a continuous flow of the uneducated and unskilled in the towns, they are the progenitors of future urban slums and the hard core of the industrial unemployment," says the report issued today in the Commons by Agriculture Minister Hayes. The study says Quebec standards of education lagged behind others acclimated and that Ontario, Quebec, and the report says "are failing to train their young farm people to fit into a rapidly-changing economic environment of today." Mr. Hayes said the study, ordered by the former Conservative government, doesn't reflect government views but is an independent appraisal. REDEFINITION OF FARMS R urges a redefinition of farms and what the report has a prelude to a concerted attack by the departments of agriculture, finance, trade, industry, labor and national resources. The study is based on detailed replies from 648 farmers in 22 zones of Eastern Canada—approximately 150 farmers in five zones of Ontario, 300 farmers in 10 zones of Quebec, 90 farmers in three districts of New Brunswick, 90 in three districts of Nova Scotia and 30 in a section of Prince Edward Island. The actual farmer interviews were conducted by field representatives of the Farm Credit Corporation, the federal agency providing long-term farm mortgage credit across the country. The districts visited included: Quebec: Small towns in Gaspé, Matapédia - Manicouagan, Kamouraska, Dorchester, Brome-Montserrat, Les Trois-Rivières, Charlevoix, Champlain, Joliette - l'Assomption, Montmagny and Postville-Tremblant. New Brunswick: Millville area, York County; Havelsack area, King's County; St. Paul area, Kent County. Nova Scotia: Annapolis - Pictou, Cumberland County; Halifax, Musquodouit River, Hants County, East River, Pictou County. Prince Edward Island: Bristol, Pictou, King's County. The report also took a side look at the much-discussed eastern feed grain situation and dismisses this as a deep-rooted cause of eastern farm problems. LITTLE IMPACT Farmers may not be satisfied with prices they have to pay, it says, but a solution at best would have relatively little impact on the local economic problem. On the over-all eastern farm problem, the study's observation No. 1 says: "Approximately 50 per cent of the farmers in the study area, if provided with suitable alternative employment, a national young man who acted as a oarsman for an accompanying boat.
