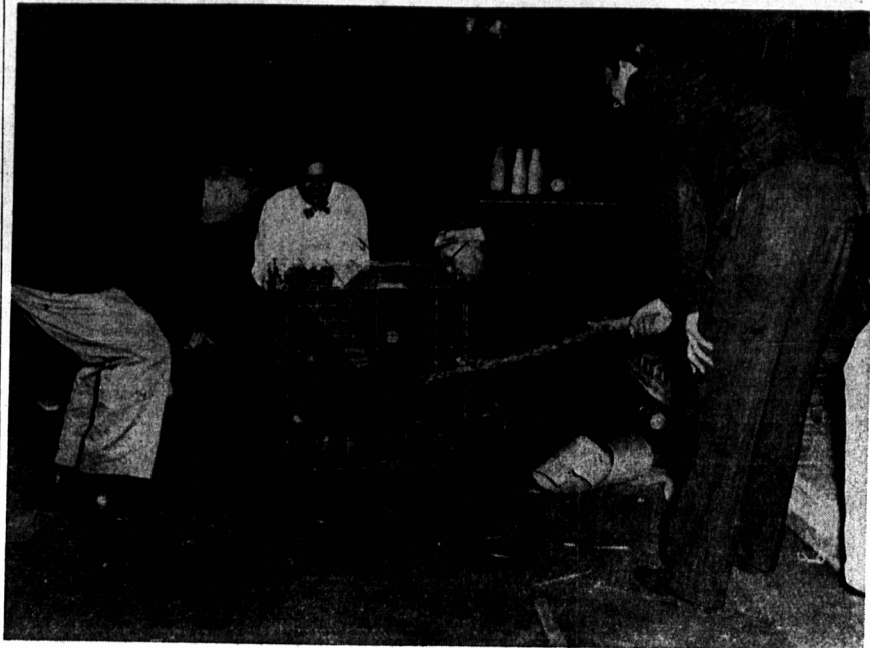


**Racoon Provides Excitement Before Carnival**

**Charges Laid**

Violence stole the sum of \$700.00 from the property of Lester Harvey Lavers, Georgetown. The same three are also charged with breaking from the Georgetown jail by forcing the bars on a window.

The third charge laid was against J. Charles Martell and LeRoy A. Hatch, both of Georgetown, for breaking from the jail by forcing the bars on a window. The latter two are believed to have been out of jail on at least one other occasion although Hatch is not accused of having been out of jail the night the robbery was committed.

The robbery with violence charge arose from an attack on the late evening of Friday, May 21, and Saturday morning, May 22. Late Friday night Mr. Lavers, in pyjamas, was reading in the back room of his residence which has a small store in front. He heard knocking and then pounding at the back door, but not wanting to admit strangers when it was nearly midnight, tried to hold down the guard bar across the door.

However the door was forced and three men came into the room, seized the elderly man, tied him up and then gagged him. They demanded the combination of the safe in the room, but later discovered it was a key type. Mr. Lavers refused to tell them where the key was so they took him from the chair and tossed him on the couch.

They then obtained crowbars and pickaxes from the store and attacked the safe. Eventually they succeeded in breaking through into one of the compartments and took all available money and cheques. They found more in the nearby desk and an additional \$25 elsewhere in the store. At first it was thought the total was \$625 but that estimate has since been revised upward.

The three men were in the Lavers place for nearly three hours before leaving by the front door. The victim finally managed to roll off the couch and make his way to a knife and then free himself. He then called police. While officers of the R.C.M.P. were investigating Saturday morning they received a call from the jail that the cut window bars had been discovered and the eight prisoners removed to another barred room. All the prisoners were then ordered taken to county jails in Charlottetown and Summerside on instructions from Attorney General W. B. Darby, Q. C.

**Maritime Director For Y's Men's Clubs**

**COMMUNITY TREE PLANTING AT CRAPAUD INAUGURATED YESTERDAY**

The long awaited community tree planting program at Crapaud was carried out yesterday afternoon when Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources, planted two pin oaks in front of the public library.

The ceremony was attended by officers of the Community Planning Association of Prince Edward Island, residents of the town, and members of Town Planning, Mr. G. Claude Smith.

Late last fall the village authorities showed interest in such a project where the new Trans-Canada Highway passes through the village. The Community Planning Association decided to sponsor the project as an incentive to other communities to follow suit. It is an endeavour to replace by new types trees which are uprooted by tree highway construction.

One hundred trees were ordered from Holland and comprise three species, Norway maples, pin oaks and Schweifen maples. The people of Crapaud provided the labor by digging the holes and also provided the stakes to protect the trees.

**Government Assistance**

The Community Planning Association approached the Provincial Government for encouragement and support for this type of project and were pleased by a decision of the Government to provide assistance to any organized community on a dollar for dollar basis not exceeding \$100.

Crapaud provided the example and yesterday the officials in charge carried out the various phases. It is also intended to level the back slopes of the road and to provide grass seed so that in a year or so it will be a pleasure to drive over this stretch of highway.

In his remarks yesterday the Minister congratulated the people of Crapaud on their foresight and stated that this was not the first instance of community spirit exhibited by the people of this thriving community. He said all within the space of three years they had become incorporated as a village.
