PORK IN CHICAGO.—In Chicago on Wednesday August pork closed at \$11 67, and September pork at \$11 40.

MURDERERS ACQUITTED.—Two women who killed their lovers have been acquitted by New York juries within a month, because they were women.

FOR HALIFAX.—The steamer Fastnet, Captain Crews, left for Halifax about half-past four last evening with a cargo of lobsters, potatoes, pork and oats. There were 149 passengers.

POSTOFFICE.—The Hall-Fitzsimmons office, to have taken place near St. Paul, Mass. on Wednesday night, has been declared "off." The authorities were bound to stop the mail.

THE ANTIQUARIAN WATERWORKS.—The contractors for the Antigonish, N. S., waterworks have completed their work, which gives good satisfaction. The pipes are laid between 6 and 7 miles into the town and there is a pressure of 130 lbs. to the square inch.

LABOR LAY.—The adjourned labor day celebration in Halifax on Wednesday, was a big success. The procession included nearly 4000 men of the various labor organizations, besides many societies formed of workmen in some of the establishments. Most of the participants of Halifax are manned by employees exclusively belonging to the labor organizations. The picnic in the afternoon was attended by 2,500 people.

ENTOMOLOGICAL.—We were shown on Friday by Mr. F. Carter a fine glossy-coated specimen of *Bista* which he caught on some imported bananas. As all the insects of this genus are very omnivorous and destructive, prowling about at night and devouring fruit and other eatables, it will be well to keep this sleek foreigner in close confinement so as to prevent any chance of the propagation of the kind.

THE EDITH.—A Baltimore despatch of the 20th says: The brig Edith, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., which was sunk at quarantine by the four-masted schooner Henry S. Little, has been temporarily repaired and will leave for New York to-morrow if a tug arrives from New York as expected. The Edith will be turned into a barge by the Greenpoint Lighterage company, which purchased the vessel at public sale last week.

THE YOUNG MEMORIAL.—They are having a good deal of trouble in St. John over the building of the monument to Fred Young, the Courtenay Bay hero. It was decided to erect the monument in the old cemetery, and a hole was dug for the foundation, which hole was promptly filled in by a band of indignant loyalist citizens, who did not propose to stand by and see the graves of the early settlers desecrated. The general feeling appears to be that the monument should be erected on King square.

POLICE COURT.—This morning two countrymen, for being drunk and fighting in a yard on Upper Queen Street, were fined \$4 and costs each, and in the case of a man charged with being drunk and fighting on Grafton Street, judgment was reserved pending the arrest of the other party to the affair. An Indian was fined \$1 or 4 days for drunkenness and two boys for the same offence were each disposed of for a similar time. A man charged with assault and battery did not respond to the summons, and a warrant for his arrest was ordered.

MEETING.—At the meeting of the Maritime Medical Association held in St. John, N. B., on Wednesday, Dr. Parker, of Halifax, was elected president; Dr. E. Farrell, Dr. J. C. Brown and Dr. James McLeod, of Charlottetown, vice-presidents; Dr. Dewitt, Treasurer, and Dr. Morrow secretary. Dr. Steeves read a paper entitled "Remarks on Mononucleosis," and Dr. Farrell a paper on "Delay in Surgery." Dr. Inches read a paper on "Croup and its relation to Diphtheria." All the papers were discussed at length. Dr. McLeod, of Charlottetown, took a leading part in the discussion.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

OTTAWA, July 24.

The budget debate was continued yesterday. Michael Adams of Northumberland made a powerful speech. An arrangement was concluded last night to close the debate on Tuesday night.

In the public accounts committee further evidence was given of trifling irregularities in the Interior Department similar to that already elicited.

Regarding the item of six hundred dollars charged against Bourgeois of the Three Rivers postoffice, and which he said he never received, the Postmaster General explained that Bourgeois claimed three thousand, had been tendered a check for six hundred in settlement, which he refused. The check was still in the Department.

SIR JOHN'S C. P. R. STOCK.

An Authoritative Statement.

OTTAWA, July 24.

Sir John Macdonald's executors have published a letter in which they state that Sir John, at the time of his death, held one hundred and twenty-two shares of Canadian Pacific Railway stock, which he had purchased in open market at the latter end of the year 1888, and paid for with his own money; and, excepting those shares, Sir John was never possessed of any C. P. R. stock, either in his own name or that of any other person.

ADDITIONAL PARTICULARS.

OTTAWA, July 24.

In the Tarte-McGreevy enquiry yesterday Robert McGreevy's examination occupied all day. His testimony was largely corroborative of Murphy's. But he swore that besides the jewelry given to Mr. Perley, two thousand dollars were given to Perley's son. Three thousand dollars went towards the election of Hon. Mr. Rhodes, Mercier's Minister of Agriculture.

THE PREMIER COUNT

Reception at Montreal.

MONTREAL, July 24.

Premier Mercier was received last night by a great crowd of the citizens of Montreal. Very little enthusiasm was displayed in the English quarter. But in the French quarters houses were brilliantly illuminated. Mayor McShane read a congratulatory address. Mercier attempted to reply but the uproar was so great that he had to stop—and the proceedings came to an abrupt termination.

General Telegraphic News.

EASTPORT, Me., July 22.—The Sentinel is out to-day with a fac simile of the chart of Passamaquoddy Bay, by Admiral Owen, R. N., in 1847, from which it is clearly evident that the recent seizure of fishing boats made by the Canadian cruiser Dream is illegal. The U. S. Steamer Woodbury, ordered here by the Secretary of the Treasury, is expected hourly.

LONDON, July 22.—In the House of Commons to-day in committee of supply, it was voted to give \$300,000 as salaries and expenses for the relief of the suffering poor of Ireland.

WASHINGTON, July 22.—At the request of the British minister, the secretary of the treasury has directed a suspension of the order for the deportation to China of the Chinaman recently convicted at Port Huron, Mich., of illegal entry into the United States, pending further investigation of the case. It has been ascertained that Chinamen who have acquired a legal residence in Canada should be allowed to return to that country.

Fishery Bulletin.

(Fisheries Intelligence Bureau Report.)

HALIFAX, July 24.—The codfishery at the various stations to-day is reported as follows: Good at St. John River and long Point, Que.; fair at Seven Islands, Shelldrake, Que.; point Escuminac, N. B., and Malpeque, P. E. I. The fishery all over the coast of Cape Breton is reported poor, excepting at Arichat, where it is fair. In Nova Scotia, good; at Canso, fair; at Isaac's Harbor, Musquodoboit Harbor, Lockeport and Yarmouth, fair. Poor at Lunenburg, Port Latour and Digby. The Haddock fishery is reported fair at Canso, Isaac's Harbor, Port Latour and Yarmouth. Hake and haddock very good at Digby. Mackerel fishing fair on the north side of P. E. I.; good at Phee's Shore, but poor at Alberton and from there down the coast to Georgetown. No mackerel are reported on the coast of Cape Breton or Nova Scotia, excepting a few at Port Latour. A fair quantity of tinklers at Yarmouth and schools in St. Mary's Bay. Herring fishing reported fair at English Bay, very good at Souris, P. E. I.; good at St. Ann's, North Sydney and Arichat, C. B.; fair at Ingonish and Louisbourg; good at Canso, N. S., and fair at Musquodoboit, Lockeport, Port Latour, and Digby. A few squid reported at Ingonish. St. Ann's and squid reported at Ingonish. Cause of the Mutiny.

It is stated that the cause of the mutiny of the Coldstream Guards was that the men were greatly dissatisfied at the extra duty which they were compelled to perform during the recent visit of the Emperor of Germany to London. This fact, together with the refusal of the officers to grant the men at least a day free from duty led to open insubordination during drill at St. James Park. The men were marched back to Wellington barracks. Orders were issued confining the men to barracks for three days as a punishment and ten senior privates were placed under arrest with a view of trying them by court martial. The main body of the guardsman thereupon barricaded themselves in one of the rooms and declined to emerge until the order affecting the ten seniors were rescinded. After much parley the mutineers finally yielded.

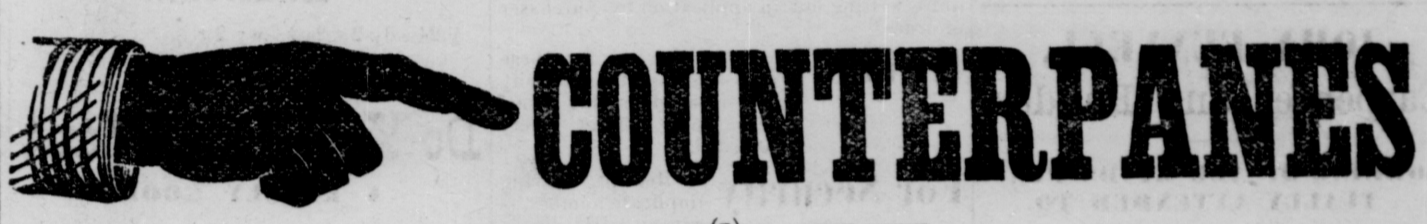
