"Business As Usual" Over Says Claxton On Maritime Speaking Tour

HALIFAX, Jan. 19 (CP) - Defence Minister Claxton swung into New Brunswick on his Maritime tour today, after warning a Halifax audience that "business as usual is over."

Amid Ottawa reports that the defence budget this year will soar to \$1,500,000,000, he told the Halifax Board of Trade last night that the "program I shall be putting before the next session of Parliament will leave no doubt in the minds of anyone that business as usual is over."

Instead, he said, there is going to be more business than usual which would put pressure on resources of manpower, raw material and the productive capacity of the Dominion.

Defence had become Canada's biggest business. Expenditures of \$194,000,000 four years ago compared with an appropriation of \$567,000,000 this year and \$1,500,000,000 in total commitments. Other Government departments were spending more than \$100,000,000 on defence matters.

"War," he said, "is not inevitable, neither is peace."

These were some of the results: 1. Canada and the United States were setting up a ring of stations on the coasts of Labrador and Newfoundland.

2. Orders had been placed for tooling up for the production of U.S. type motor vehicles and other military equipment in Canada.

3. Canada has proposed that she manufacture radar and wireless sets, medium guns and aircraft for the federal labor department. It was announced today.

The department said preliminary figures for 1950 show 137 strikes and lockouts, involving 189,981 workers, with a time loss of 1,389,234 days. This compared with 137 work stoppages in 1949, with 51,437 workers involved and a loss of 1,053,667 days.

The peak year since 1939 was 1948 when there were 228 strikes and lockouts, with 139,474 workers involved and a loss of 4,516,393 days. In 1943 there were 402 work stoppages involving 218,404 workers, but the time loss was only 1,040,000 days.
