

Flyers Whip B.Y.C. 11-6

Carver Bros. Run Wild; Get 19 Pts.; Allie Tops With 8

The league-leading Parkdale Flyers strengthened their grip on the top rung of the Island Senior Hockey League ladder and brought the 4-game winning streak of the B.Y.C. to a sudden halt last night at the Sports Arena when they trimmed the youth clubbers 11-6.

Reunited once again the Carver Bros. demolished the B.Y.C. all by themselves slamming home nine of the 11 goals and picking up a grand total of 19 points between them. Leftwinger Skip paced the goalscoring attack notching four while Orin slammed in three and coach Allie top Defense man Kip Reedy and speedy Jim MacLeod hit for the other Parkdale goals.

ALLIE-CARVER TOPS

Allie Carver was the top performer of the night adding six assists to his two goals for 8 points. Skip came through with two assists for 6 points and Orin had 2 assists for 5 points.

Merrill Pineau and coach Jack Reedy each triggered two goals for the youth club. Jack Burke and Johnny Squarebriggs shot the others.

Reedy and Pineau each had one assist and centerman Buck Whitlock led on three goals.

It was exceptionally clean game and viewed by close to 1,000 customers. Only four penalties were called, two to each team. Two of the penalties were majors going to Frank Shepherd and Buddy Clark for fighting in the third period. Each team scored while the other had a player in the penalty box. Reedy gave the B.Y.C. a 6-5 lead in the second with Josey sitting out a tripping penalty and Kip Reedy shot his first goal of the season with Whitlock off slashing.

OPEN SCORING

The Flyers opened up a 2-goal lead in the first five minutes of play only to see it vanish as the B.Y.C. came back with three straight goals to lead 3-2 going into the second. The Flyers outscored the youth clubbers 5-3 in the second and with a 7-6 lead going into the third shutout B.Y.C. and scored four goals without answer.

Allie Carver put Parkdale one up after 43 seconds of play with Orin and Skip assisting. Jim MacLeod grabbed a loose puck at center ice at 4:41 and broke into the clear to beat Doyle for the second Parkdale goal. B.Y.C. stormed back after that and Johnny Squarebriggs, Merrill Pineau and Jack Reedy hit in that order.

Skip Carver scored two in a row as the second opened for a 4-4 Parkdale lead and after Pineau tied it up at 7:01, Skip was back again as he battled in Allie's pass-out from the corner. Hard-working Jack Burke tied the score again at 8:55 and Reedy put B.Y.C. in front as his shot deflected off a Parkdale defenseman behind Reeper. Kip Reedy picked the corner on a shot from the blueline at 18:45 and Orin Carver got the winner at 19:40 picking the short side as he sailed in on the right wing.

WINGS OVERPOWER CHICAGO 6-2 TO TIE FOR NHL LEAD

DETROIT (AP)—Detroit Red Wings shot back into a first-place tie for the National Hockey League lead Thursday night with a 6-2 win over Chicago Black Hawks. Detroit's Gordie Howe and Dutch Reibel scored two goals each.

By scoring two goals and getting assists on two others, Howe tied Jean Beliveau of Montreal Canadiens with 58 points for the scoring lead. Red Wings and it was Detroit's fifth home triumph without a setback over the Black Hawks.

Howe put the Wings into a 2-0 lead with goals in the first and second periods. His first was a 35-footer that knocked Chicago goalie Al Rollins back into his nets.

Howe got his next—his 29th of the season—on a 15-foot backhander after a perfect pass from Norm Ullman.

After Hank Giesla got the Hawks to within one goal by converting Harry Watson's rebound shot, Reibel struck with six seconds remaining in the second period to hike Detroit's margin to 3-1.

Jack McIntyre scored in the first minute of the final period before Detroit pulled away on goals by Ted Lindsay, Reibel and Ullman in a little more than five minutes.

1957 National League Looms As Another Mad Scramble

NEW YORK (AP)—Will Brooklyn Dodgers miss the intangible inspirational qualities of Jackie Robinson more than they realize? Will the acquisition of Warren Hacker give Cincinnati Redlegs enough needed pitching strength to enable them to come home in front?

Can Milwaukee Braves be expected to do better if they don't plug those weak spots at second base and in left field?

How much will Sam Jones and Del Ennis help St. Louis Cardinals?

Tune in next fall and get the answers to these intriguing questions concerning the 1957 National League race, which as of now looms as a duplicate of the mad scramble last year.

The reason it looks like more of the same is that none of the really contending teams of last year have gone all out in the trading market in an effort to overcome obvious weaknesses.

As mentioned, the Dodgers might have lost more than they realize in Robinson. But the Bums are going to be hard to dislodge, particularly as they have Johnny Podres returning, and have a promising southpaw coming up from Montreal. He is Fred Kipp, and he and Podres may give Brooklyn the left-handed pitching strength they have lacked.

Milwaukee hasn't done much about second base and left field. There have been rumors the Braves were after Gene Baker of the Cubs, or Red Schoendienst of the Giants, for the second base spot. However, so far those have been just rumors.

The Redlegs surprised everyone by finishing only two games out of first place last year, despite the indispositions of big Ted Kluszewski. If he reports sound, and Hacker gives the pitching staff the needed lift, and Don Hoak, also from the Cubs, fills the third base spot, Cincinnati certainly figures to be better. And they don't have to be.

The Cardinals have Sam Jones, but there is doubt if they have enough pitching yet. Del Ennis should be a good power man, but power has not been their problem. The Redbirds have far, far to go, though.

The Phillies got Rip Repulski from the Cards in exchange for Ennis, but that's about the extent of their swapping. The Pirates are waiting for their boys to grow up. The Giants? Nobody deserves such troubles.
