Canadian sportswriters were generally calm over a last-minute decision that placed Canada's hockey team fourth instead of third in the official standings at the Winter Olympics in Innsbruck, Austria.

Several were more angry at the reaction of Canada's Olympic officials than the International Ice Hockey Federation's decision to settle a three-day dispute by cancelling goals for and against over an seven-game spread, but there were dissenters.

"One of the rankest stuffs since Hitler took over Austria," cabled Jack Kinella, Ottawa Citizen columnist, "is the fact that the IIFH had not accepted Canada's demands the spread only take into account games the four top teams played against each other, a decision that would have awarded the bronze medal to Canada instead of Czechoslovakia."

Desk Clerk Quits Hotel To Become Hockey Scout

EDMONTON (CP) — It isn't often that a man jumps from the hotel game into professional hockey, but Clarence Moher of Detroit Red Wings graduated with honors.

He joined the Red Wings in 1946 to search Alberta for hockey talent when he was a desk clerk at the Edmon hotel. In the 1953-54 season, when professional hockey was introduced in Alberta, he became chief West coast scout of the NHL club.

Moher, 48, was instrumental in signing 24 players who were on professional rosters last season.

Included in this group were four NHL stalwarts — Johnny Bucyk of Boston and Norm Ullman, Eddie Joyal and Bruce McGregor of Detroit. Most climbed up through the Edmonton Oil Kings' minor system.

Moher, a little, round man with a worried look, travels thousands of miles through the West each season in his search for talent. Often he's called somewhere by friends or ac-

quaintances who have been briefed on what Moher is looking for in prospective major league hockey players.

NO FIXED RULES

"The ideal situation is to find a boy who's big, strong and a good skater," he said.

"If he has brains, that helps, but sometimes you lose the smart ones to the universities."

There can be no set time or place for finding prospects, said Moher, who has witnessed the signing of tryout contracts by players aged anywhere from 15 to 22.

His first was Len Haley.

"I signed him a couple of months after I telephoned Jack Adams and told him I wanted to be a scout of the Red Wings" that I knew they didn't have a scout in Alberta, and I said I thought I could do a good job."

Haley played briefly in the NHL with Detroit, but spent most of his career in the Western Hockey League, and now is playing with San Francisco Seals of the WHL.

Emile Griffith Flattens Dupas

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — World welterweight boxing champion Emile Griffith of New York Monday night knocked out Ralph Dupas of New Orleans in the third round of a non-title bout scheduled for 10 rounds.

Dupas, almost helpless under Griffith's fists, went down for a crashing right in the jaw after two minutes of the third round. He had been floored three times in the second and the crowd was screaming to referee Vic Patrick to stop the fight before the end came.

Dupas hit his head as he fell and lay still as Patrick counted him out. Ambulance men rushed into the ring and mopped blood from Dupas' face and applied ice packs to the back of his neck. He remained in the ring five minutes before he was helped to his dressing room.

Griffith, obviously worried and concerned, waited beside Dupas until he showed signs of recovering.
