OTTAWA, Sept. 30—(CP)—Carloadings on Canadian railways increased during the week ended Sept. 23 to the highest mark this year at 80,307 cars, compared with 88,000 cars for the previous week, and 85,993 cars for the corresponding week a year ago.

The Bureau of Statistics reported today that gains over the similar week last year were shown in loading of coke, ore, pulpwood, lumber, gasoline and woodpulp and paper. Minor declines were registered in loadings of grain products, livestock and coal.
