Continued from page 1. man, 28, an auto salesman and former prison guard. Armed with knives and clubs, they burst into the Millman home and tied up him and his wife. The prisoners then ransacked the house smashing furniture in their hurry to get clothing and money. They took Millman's pistol and auto and fled.

The 13 split up a few miles further on. Six stayed in the millman car which came to a disastrous end when it cracked up while trying to run a state police blockade. Several shots were fired by police who recaptured the car's six occupants within a short time.

Two of the other fugitives struck out for themselves and one was captured within a few hours at a hotel. The other five burst into the home of Joseph Watts, a service station operator. They held him at gunpoint while they donned some of his clothes from the closets and fled in his car, taking Watts' wife and Miss Gilbert as hostages.

Then followed a long night of frantic driving by the convicts who tried to slip through the hastily-erected police blockades. Nine hours later police closed in on the car, fearful of a gun battle which might bring harm to the women hostages. The fleeing convicts abandoned the car and released the women on Detroit's outskirts. The five then fled on foot, two in one group, three in another and were swallowed up in the city.

Prison officials said that the break had been rumored for several weeks and that all possible precautions had been taken to prevent it. The big prison was the scene of violence last year. On April 20, a four-day rebellion flared. One prisoner was killed, nine were wounded and more than \$1,000,000 damage was done.

On July 6, another uprising developed with prisoners seizing three guards but state troopers moved into the prison and broke up the mutiny in a hurry.

Ice-Making May Begin At New Stadium This Week

Work on the new Raceway Stadium at Summerside has progressed so rapidly that Mr. Harold Gaudet, president of the company, stated last evening that ice making would probably begin this week.

The outside work on the building has been completed except for a few minor details, and while work on the inside of the building has simultaneously been going along nicely it should not take very long to complete it. The various rooms at the front of the rink have been practically completed, and wiring, plumbing, and heating work is proceeding.

The overhead promenade extends the full length of each side, and seating accommodation is being installed nearer to the ice area. A feature of the seating arrangement made possible by the use of the steel frame construction, permits full view of the ice area unobstructed by supporting posts.

The outside of the rink is covered with a hard grey asbestos covering, and the roof is shingled with black asphalt. If cold weather continues, and satisfactory progress is made on the interior work, it is possible that sufficient ice might be made to permit skating in the new rink around the first of the new year.

Continued from page 1. fragments, ripe for Communist pluckings. Biggest Question Patchwork planning has brought temporary economic stability that is dazzling in the boom towns of Tokyo and Manila. But it rests mainly upon American dollar expenditures and the boom will collapse when they end.

No progress has been made toward solving the great fundamental problems of Asia-Japan's growing, crowded population; South Korea's inability to support itself; India's vast need for modernization. And the biggest question of all remains unanswered: "Can free Asia exist alongside a powerful, aggressive Red China?"

All indications are that the Chinese Communists now are profiting from their internal control and strengthening their armies for the next step in a timeless blueprint of conquest.

Order Change In Bridge Location

OGDENSBURG, N. Y., (AP) - The Canadian government has notified the Ogdensburg bridge authority here that plans for a proposed span across the St. Lawrence River must be changed, moving the bridge to a new site. Bridge authority members said the Canadian order will delay the construction project a year.

The authority said Lionel Chevrier, Canadian transport minister, had informed them that the bridge must be moved to a Canadian terminus outside of Prescott, Ont., because of strenuous objections from residents of that community.

The joint New York State-Canadian authority had planned to erect the span between this city and Prescott. Test borings have been completed.
