Upsets Feature Play In Quebec Tennis Tourney

Simmerings Around The Sport Front

MONTREAL, June 26.—Elimination of Bill Fedlar of Toronto and Lewis Duff of Montreal upset the orderly advances of favorites in the early rounds of the Quebec Provincial Tennis Championships here today.

Favorite to gain a place on Canada's Davis Cup team as doubles partner for Phil Pearson of Toronto, Fedlar found the pace of singles competition too fast and lost a first round match to Jean Richer, young Montreal player. The score was 2-6, 7-5, 6-4.

Duff, Ontario title last year but a disappointment in both the Ontario and Dominion tournaments this season, went out in the second round to Bob Barnard, of Montreal, 6-1, 2-6, 6-1.

Duff's defeat cost the University of Miami redhead his opportunity of representing Canada at the Wimbledon tournament. He and Pearson reached the Canadian finals at Windsor, Ont., last week after winning the Ontario title the previous week.

Elsewhere, players advanced according to expectation. Laird Watt of Montreal, Bruce Hall, of Toronto, Bill Leggett, of Hamilton, and Don McElmard, of Ottawa, marched to easy victories.

Watt, defending champion, is favored to retain his title but is not a candidate for the Cup team. He resigned his title last year against Japan but decided against playing in the international competition again this season.

With the exception of the victories scored by Richer and Barnard, the play of Gordon Robinson of Niagara Falls, Ont., was the feature of today's matches which saw the first round and most of the second round of the men's singles completed.

Robinson, forced out of the Dominion and Ontario meets by a wrist injury, gained the third round after two hard-fought three-set matches. He defeated Lorne Duguid, Montreal hockey player, 6-3, 8-10, 6-4, in a two-hour first-round battle, and won 6-1, 4-5 from Gordon Shorter, of Ottawa in the second round.

Ranked sixth in Canada, Robinson was forced to the limit in both rounds by the durability of the experience carried him through. If he can regain the form he showed a year ago he will be a leading contender for a Davis Cup post.

The SNAPSHOT GUILD

CORRECT EXPOSURE



The right exposure—corrected for each situation—yields better pictures. For this average subject, on a cloudy-bright day, 1/25 second at f.8 lens opening is correct. On a sunny day, with the same subject, 1/25 second at f.11 is proper.

NOW that spring is here, the days seem brighter as well as longer. This apparent brightness may deceive some of us into shortening our outdoor exposures—but we should be cautious in so doing.

Underexposure is the most frequent fault in amateur snapshots. A picture printed from an underexposed negative has a harsh appearance. The shadows are too black and lack detail, and by comparison the bright areas appear excessively bright. If many of your pictures have this appearance, you should practice giving fuller exposure, either through choice of a larger lens opening or longer shutter time.

Modern films have broad exposure latitude, to take care of reasonable errors in exposure. But we should not ask too much, and we should remember that a correctly-exposed negative always produces the best print. When we are in doubt, it is usually wiser to give a full exposure rather than one that may be too short.

Here are typical correct exposures for the "chrome" type films that most of us prefer for outdoor picture taking:

BRILLIANT DAY: Average subject, 1/25 second at f.11 lens opening; open landscape, 1/25 second at f.16; water or beach scenes, 1/25 second at f.22.

CLOUDY BRIGHT DAY: Average subject, 1/25 second at f.8; open landscape, 1/25 at f.11; water or beach scenes, 1/25 at f.16.

DULL DAY: Average subject, 1/25 at f.6.3; open landscape, 1/25 at f.8; water or beach scenes, 1/25 at f.11.

With box cameras on dull days, a very short time exposure should be given, with the camera on a firm support. This exposure should be made with the second stop opening, and about as fast as you can work the shutter when set for "time." Snapshots can be taken with a box camera on any sunny day or well out in the open light on a cloudy-bright day.

Late in the afternoon, or early in the morning, light is weaker, and exposures should be lengthened accordingly. Form the habit of correct exposure, and your pictures will improve.
