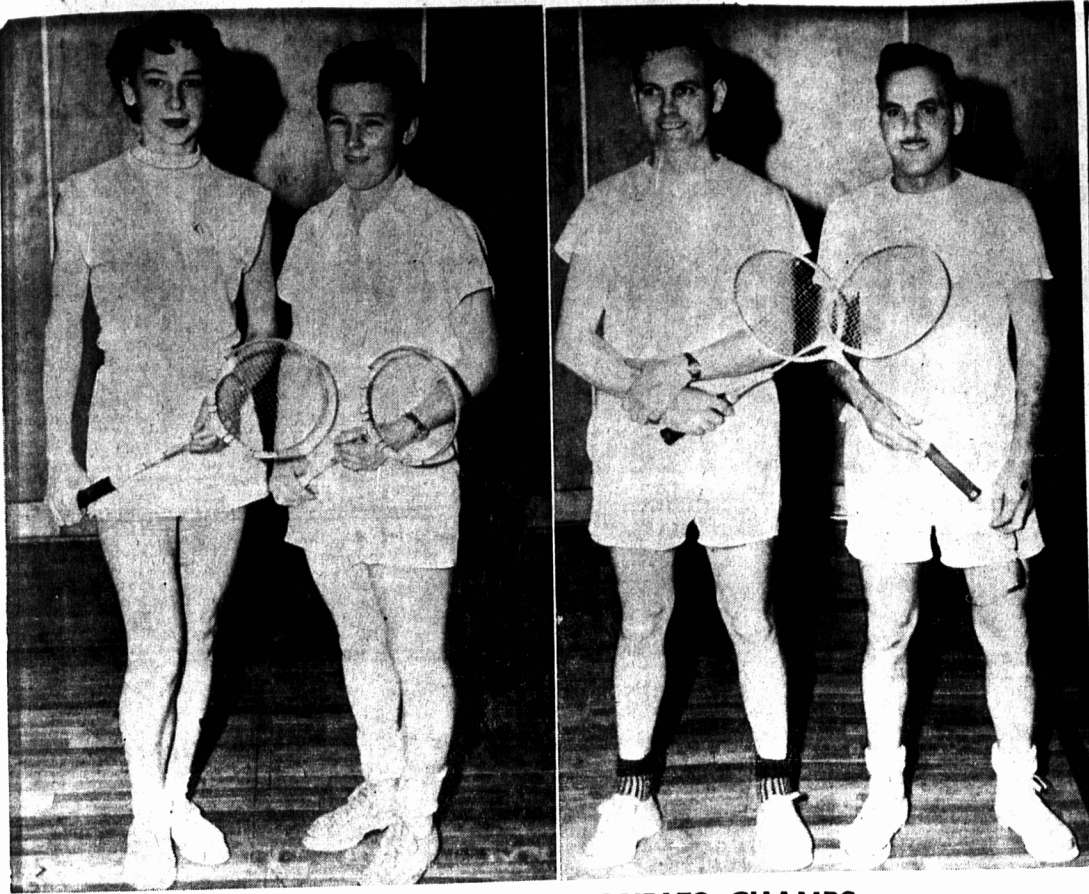

## N. B. Teams Will Challenge For Eastern Canadian Title

MONCTON (CP) — New Brunswick teams will challenge for the eastern Canada football title this year in both intermediate and junior divisions. Warren Hammond, secretary-treasurer of the New Brunswick Football League, said Monday.

The league, in annual session here Sunday, made plans for a five-team intermediate schedule to be completed in time for the Maritime intermediate playoff Nov. 3.

St. Thomas University of Chatham, N. B., the province's lone junior club, will play exhibition games with intermediate teams prior to the Maritime junior playoff Oct. 27.

The eastern Canada intermediate championship will be played in Halifax Nov. 10. The junior final is slated for Montreal.

Mr. Hammond said both intermediate and junior winners will compete in the eastern finals should they manage to get past the Nova Scotia winners. Both Maritime finals will be played in New Brunswick.

Teams in the intermediate circuit will be Mount Allison University, University of New Brunswick, St. Thomas University, Moncton Football Association and Saint John Sept. 15.

Mr. Hammond said UNB also may enter junior competition with St. Thomas if enough prospective players turn out.

## Paternity Suit Against Bill Loes

NEWARK, N. J. (AP) — A paternity suit against pitcher Billy Loes of Newark, N. J., was postponed Monday to give him time to undergo blood tests.

Negative results would disprove charges that he is the father of a three-year-old girl. However, a positive result would not be proof that he is.

The suit has been postponed until June 21 and Loes was continued in \$500 bail.

Suzanne Fulinello has charged that Loes is the father of a girl born to her after she met Loes in spring training at Deerfield, Fla. Loes has denied knowing her or being the father.

Miss Fulinello was scheduled to go on trial later Monday on charges of participating in the attempted holdup of an insurance company office in 1955.

## Carnera Sues Columbia Pictures

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP) — Former heavyweight boxing champion Primo Carnera Monday sued Columbia Pictures for \$1,500,000, charging invasion of privacy in the film *The Harder They Fall*.

The big athlete contends the picture has caused him to be subjected to scorn and ridicule and that as a result of it he has lost the respect and admiration of many friends.

The suit said that although its makers claim the film's hero, Toro Molina, does not depict Carnera, he is identifiable as such because of his build and weight. Molina is characterized as a stupid person unable to conduct business affairs, the suit alleged.

## COMPOSER ARRIVES HOME

FRANKFURT, Germany (AP) — Paul Abraham, who composed some of Germany's most popular light operas, returned Monday, more than 20 years after he had fled from Nazi oppression. The Hungarian-born Jewish composer had been a patient in a New York

mental hospital since he suffered lapses of memory. A West German consulate officer said his musical abilities had not been impaired.

## WIN DART HONORS

STARTFORD, Ont. (CP) — Two men Saturday night posted the highest possible dart score—180 on

three triple 20's — in the same match. Robert Charles and Norman Bayne competed in a city dart league competition. They were presented with certificates for the feat—roughly equivalent to golf's hole-in-one—or the fish that got away.

## Canadian Bantam Champ Retires

QUEBEC (CP) — Fernando Gagnon, 32-year-old Canadian bantamweight champ has retired from boxing. Gene Letourneau, national commissioner of the Canadian Boxing Federation, announced today.

Gagnon, a native of Disraeli, Wolfe County, Que., has held the title since he defeated Eddy Petrin Aug. 26, 1946. He is a former resident of Quebec City, and now works in Montreal.

Mr. Letourneau said Gagnon informed the federation by letter, he was retiring. The title automatically has been declared vacant.

## Ireland Downs Finland 4-1

DUBLIN (AP) — Ireland Sunday defeated Finland 4-1 in their Davis Cup tennis series and qualified to meet Germany in the second round of the European zone competition.

Joe Hackell, Ireland, defeated Sackari Ialo 6-2, 6-3, 6-1 in the final singles match. Earlier Guy Jackson, Ireland, defeated Vieno Nyssonen 6-2, 6-3, 6-3.

## Wirtz Disputes Testimony Of Sam Becker

NEW YORK (AP) — Promoter Jim Norris, president of the International Boxing Club, and his partner, Arthur Wirtz, Monday testified for the defence to outline details of the IBC operations which the government charges act as a monopoly on pro boxing.

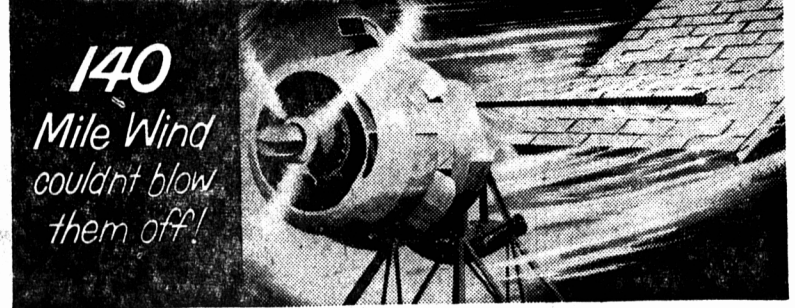
Wirtz disputed the testimony of Sam Becker, Cincinnati promoter, that Norris had asked \$150,000 to let Becker stage the Jersey Joe Walcott - Ezzard Charles heavyweight title match in 1949 in Cincinnati.

"Both Jim Norris and I told Mr. Becker we were not interested in holding the match in Cincinnati," said Wirtz. "We told him we wanted to hold it in our home town, Chicago, and we were not interested in his proposition."

Wirtz said he contacted Truman Gibson, then Joe Louis' lawyer and now an IBC official, in Miami in 1949 to learn that Louis was willing to surrender exclusive contracts to four contenders—Charles, Walcott, Lee Savold and Gus Lesnevich—for \$150,000. He said the deal was completed at Miami about March 1, 1949 after he had determined that the National Boxing Association would recognize the winner as successor to the retired Louis.
