**LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.**

**The Louisiana Lottery Problem.**

SIR,—A cooler problem just now than

the Louisiana Lottery is the opposite here

to what it is in P. E. Island. I mean

this,—while we are trying cooling remedies

to remove the superfluous caloric we absorb,

you are depending for constitutional com-

forts on your artificial modes of raising the

temperature. You have too much of what

we have too little, and that little is a

product of art. Before entering on the

subject of the Louisiana Lottery, I want to

give you the leading points of this cold in-

dustry. There are two manufactories, one

on Tchoupitoulas Street, (pronounced

Chop-pi-too-lah) and the other on Delord

Street, crystallized in purity, and what

you cannot afford of your natural collec-

tions fit to drink. One is called the

Louisiana ice works, the other the Delord

Street ice works. There is a difference in

the making however, which I wish to note.

The Louisiana ice works makes under the

Carre patent process, which requires

metallic moulds, while the Delord Street

ice works, (which were erected by Senator

Jones of Nevada, use iron tubes, on which

water is constantly dripping. In both

cases however it is by the evapora-

tion of ammonia that the refrigeration

is produced. The freezing room

with its huge columns of ice is a marvellous

sight to behold. Bouquets, fruits, fish and

are very beautiful objects to the interested

visitor, for the flowers retain all their per-

fection of color, which is sometimes en-

hanced by prismatic effects. But to my
