It was captured a few days ago in a swamp at Grosheath by a son of William McCarthy of that neighborhood, who carried it home between two poles and afterwards sold it to its present owner. It is about a foot in length and weighs about the same around its widest part. Mr. Boieser, who has a taste for the "speechless," takes great care of it, feeding it on the milk which it drinks readily, and allowing it to travel around the room, uttering a "Come and see the turtle," or occasionally heard on the crowded streets of the eastern metropolis.

ON Tuesday last Neil McDonald, son of Bayfield, Lot 46, met with quite an accident. He went to catch a mouse and got near enough to lay hold of the animal, when the animal sprang suddenly, jumped on him and broke his leg about half way between the knee and ankle.

A BAD ONE.—Amherst Press: The notorious Thomas Davidson, alias Davis, who was escaped from the Amherst jail on July 1st last year, is now in custody in Charlottetown, and a despatch to that effect has been received from the Marshal of Charlottetown. Constable McDonald left for Charlottetown to-day to bring him back. It will be remembered that he effected his escape in broad daylight by breaking a hole through the roof of his cell, crawling along the rafters and letting himself down through the door into another room. He then went down stairs, through the kitchen and into the street. Although efforts were at the time made to recapture him, nothing was accomplished until the receipt of the telegraph announcing his arrest. When he was removed from the jail he had been confined before J. A. Davis, J. P., on July 1st last year, of stealing \$7 from an Amherst store, which was to have been given

BROKEN UP.—The old Norwegian barque that was stuck hard and fast all summer on Red Point reef, was broken up by the late easterly storm. Her remains—with the exception of the spars, which were taken to Picton—now lie scattered along the shore.

A GOOD YIELD.—Some of the big potato crops in Maine this year have been raised outside of Aroostook. On three acres of land of Mr. Henry Weymouth of East Newport, were produced 800 bushels of superior potatoes and about 100 bushels of smaller ones.

MORE STRAWBERRIES.—Mr. Samuel J. Baizley, Stylesville, picked on his farm the other day a number of ripe strawberries. He reports the blossoms very thick. From a sample left at this office the berries are luscious and fairly well developed.—Moncton Times.

WHITE OATS SHIPMENTS.—The brig Varanus cleared from Summerside on Tuesday for the West Indies with 3,300 sheeps (15,650 bushels) white oats and 70 sacks, shipped by Fenton T. Newbery.

The schooner Mary Rogers is also being loaded with white oats at Crapaud for the West Indies. She will complete her cargo here.

RANCH CATTLE FOR ENGLAND.—The largest consignment of ranch cattle ever shipped from Canada left Montreal on Wednesday, on the steamship Labrador. The number was about seven hundred and the average weight about fourteen hundred pounds. They are from the C. Chrane ranch in the Northwest Territory. The last shipment of the season leaves here on November 21. Freights outward are exceedingly large.

CORRECTION.—At the recent Provincial Exhibition, the first prize for shawl made from imported wool was awarded Mrs. Daniel Kennedy, city, and not Mrs. Daniel McKinnon, as printed; the first prize for stockings made from imported wool was also taken by Mrs. Kennedy, and not by Mrs. McLean; the second prize for socks made from imported wool was taken by Miss Katie McGregor, city, not Miss Katie McLean.

A PECULIAR ACCIDENT.—Mrs. James Brisbin, residing at Listowel, Ont., is in a precarious condition through swallowing a plum stone. While eating a plum the stone by some means got into the windpipe and from thence to the lungs, whence her medical attendants have found it impossible to dislodge it. Its presence has caused Mrs. Brisbin, who is upwards of 70 years of age, a great amount of suffering and incessant fits of coughing. There is little hope that she will survive her deplorable situation.

DISSATISFIED WIDOWS.—The Springhill News says: "Of the 43 widows of the explosion residing here, 34 yesterday signed a memorial to the Relief Fund trustees, expressing dissatisfaction with the amount allowed them, which they claim is insufficient to support their families. Mrs. Carmichael and Mrs. Dawson waited on the treasurer yesterday and showed him the document, which they still retain."
