His Majesty's heroism and high devotion to duty maintained and maintained him in the greatest respect of the people of the United States. My sympathy is with Your Honour and the people of your Province."

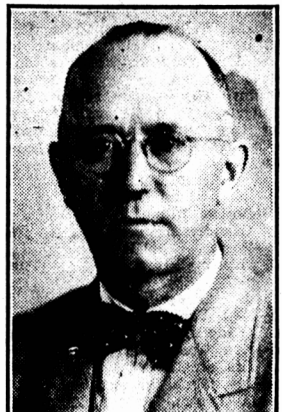

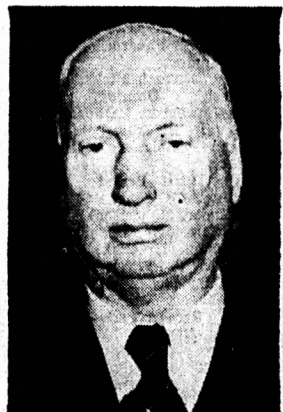

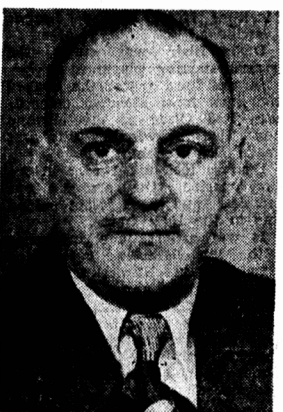

The annual meeting of the Catholic Social Welfare Bureau held at Queen Square School Auditorium on Tuesday evening, February 12th was largely attended. The President, Mr. Howard MacInnis expressed the sorrow of all in the passing of our beloved King George VI who, while he ruled an Empire, portrayed the life of a kind and loving father of a family. Sorrow also was expressed in the deaths of Mother Paula, one of the founders of the Bureau and Sr. John of the Cross whose noble, unceasing work in the Bureau most certainly contributed to her early passing in the midst of her great endeavours. Detailed reports of the President, the treasurer, the field worker and other committees for the year 1951, revealed the ever-increasing amount of social work being accomplished by the Bureau. The report of the Field Secretary, Sr. Mary Eugene, especially gave witness to the wide scope of the Bureau's day to day activities in assisting those with grave social problems. Tribute was paid to the Board of Directors with special mention to Mr. Howard MacInnis, the retiring president, for his very capable leadership and to Sr. Mary Eugene, the Field Worker and her associates for their untiring efforts on behalf of the socially affected by Dr. P. McMahon, Very Rev. A. MacLellan, Sr. William MacMillan and Mr. Eldon Green of the National Health and Welfare Department.
