

The **Transvaal War**

Made of Good Stuff.

An incident took place at the Armouries in Toronto on Saturday which not only has a big touch of romance about it but accurately mirrors how keen is the competition among Canadian military men to find a place in the contingent. The men of the 31st regiment had been drawn up for Col. Otter's inspection. As he ran his experienced eye down its ranks he noticed the well known figure of Lieut. J. H. Rorke. Calling him out, the colonel said: "Rorke, I can't take you; you are an officer."

"But I go as a private, sir," was the reply, but the colonel only answered: "I can't help that you must step out. I cannot consider you at all."

Lieut. Rorke stands 5 feet 10 inches is 23, a thorough athlete and one of the smartest officers in Canada. He was not made of the stuff to be cut down at the first rebuff. Stepping as ordered, he walked out of the Armouries. In a quarter of an hour the 31st ranks were disbanded and Colonel Otter was mounting his horse to ride home again. He had one foot in the stirrup when Lieut. Rorke walked up and saluted. "I've wired my resignation to my colonel and am now a private," he said, "have I any chance now?"

Col. Otter's strong face relaxed into a smile as he remarked: "Young man, I admire your pluck." Then he galloped away. The bystanders broke into a cheer, and the plucky lieutenant, in view of the shortage involuntarily, is yet to be taken.

In a Nutshell.

No clearer statement of the British case in this Transvaal dispute is needed than that presented by Mr. Chamberlain in the house of commons. The Transvaal government, while refusing the British residents the rights of citizens, was taxing them enormously to buy arms and equip and support a large army. The result is that the Transvaal is to-day an armed camp; and, acting in alliance with the Orange Free State, it was a serious menace to British supremacy in South Africa. Were Britain engaged in a war with some first class power, the Transvaal with its allies could easily make it very uncomfortable for British interests in that portion of the globe, perhaps even force a temporary evacuation. It was, therefore, impossible to permit such a state of affairs to continue. And the best cure for it undoubtedly was to secure the franchise for the Outlanders in the Transvaal. With the franchise the Outlanders would soon have stopped the excessive taxation, and thus stopped the waste of money on war preparations. This Kruger no doubt saw, and hence was obdurate. But the British having made the demand insisted on it, and properly too, for they realized that it meant the decision of the fate of South Africa. Hence the war. With Kruger's foolish ambitions it was, as Mr. Chamberlain said, inevitable. And now that it has come it is sound policy in the interests of all concerned that it shall be decisive, and that no room be left for any future Kruger to repeat his antics.

Both in gold and in diamonds great treasure is at stake in the Transvaal war. It is said that Great Britain's cupidity has been aroused by the rich resources of the country, and is really fighting to possess them. But the fact is that the mines are principally in

British hands, and if any robbery is contemplated it is by the Boer, who is anxious to seize this wealth and possess himself of it. The great gold mines are near the Boer capital and under the guns of elaborately constructed Boer forts. Already the Boers have seized \$4,000,000 of freshly mined gold in transit. The diamond mines are just across the border of the Orange Free State, and the burghers have assembled a large force at Boshof, within easy striking distance. Over \$100,000,000 worth of diamonds are said to be stored at Kimberly and the British force there is comparatively small. Both gold mines and diamond mines have been made what they are by immigrant labor and skill and by outside capital. They are owned largely in England. In 1896 the South African gold mines at Johannesburg paid in dividends \$7,450,000; in 1897 the amount was \$13,500,000, and last year went up to \$24,450,000. If peace had continued the production of the district this year would have surpassed that of any other by nearly one-half. Railroads built by English capital will also be seized, and of these there are 1,400 miles running northwardly from Cape Colony. Those of Natal make a total of nearly 3,000 miles. If there is a lust for gold, diamonds, more territory and enhanced power in the affairs of the world the Boers are displaying their full share of it, and they are making the most of the fact that, at the outset, the margin of physical power is on their side.
