

Milk Cheques Are Termed 'Most Dependable' Income

Sales of butter, cheese, ice cream, and powdered milk produced by Amalgamated Dairies Ltd., last year reached a new high of \$1,253,619.15 with \$1,392,855.85 having been paid to producers for milk and cream, and an additional \$48,000 distributed to patrons and shareholders in the form of cash bounties, share bonus, and interest shares from the operating profit of \$76,800.

This announcement was made at the association's sixth annual meeting in Summerside last night when retiring president Gerald Gamble told some 100 farmers that cream and milk cheques are the most dependable sources of income that the farmer has, and the importance of the dairy cow to the economy of Prince Edward Island is becoming more generally recognized.

While stating that the company had paid its patrons higher than average prices for cream and milk, the president's report noted substantial additions and improvements to the equipment in both the Summerside and O'Leary plants last year, including the installation of their own well and water pump at the Summerside plant.

High milk producer for the year was won by Gillis Brothers of Grand River; highest cream producer at the Summerside plant was Scott Cairns of Free-town; and highest cream producer at the O'Leary plant was Arnold Smallman of O'Leary.

Prizes were also awarded to the top two producers in five weight divisions having the largest increase in butter fat from the previous year, and were as follows:

One hundred to 500 pounds: 1st. Lloyd MacWilliams, O'Leary, with an increase of 1165 pounds; 2nd. George B. MacIsaac, O'Leary, 960 pounds.

Five hundred to 1,000 pounds: 1st. Morton Adams, New London, with 1026 pounds increase; 2nd. James Evans, Burlington, 990.

One thousand to 1,500 pounds: 1st. Lorne Cameron, Albany, with 1299 pounds increase; 2nd. Joseph A. Gallant, Howland, 1035 pounds. Fifteen hundred to 2,000 pounds: 1st. Lawrence Harris, O'Leary, with 2061 pounds increase; W. A. MacLennan, Tryon, 1386 pounds.

Two thousand pounds and up: 1st. Arnold Smallman, O'Leary, with 2265 pounds increase; 2nd. Elmer Reeves, Free-town, 1798 pounds.

SEVEN PRIZES
Butter and cheesemakers at both plants won a total of seven prizes during the year, and in the company's first year of producing powdered milk more than 37,000 pounds had been manufactured. But the president said that the recent government action regarding support prices make it quite unlikely that any powdered milk will be made by this company during the coming season.

A statement of the production of dairy products manufactured by Amalgamated Dairies last year, with the increase over the previous year shown in brackets, were listed as follows:

Butter, 1,043,965 pounds (67,242); cheese, 596,460 pounds (21,094); ice cream, 104,006 quarts (19,648); powdered milk 37,928 pounds.
