A COMPLAINT.—Several strangers have expressed much annoyance at the persistent begging of a large number of children in this city. The most annoying and officers were much plagued in the same way when here. For the sake of our credit in the eyes of strangers molestation of this nature should not be permitted. There is no necessity for it. SCOTT ACT REPEALED.—Voting took place on Thursday on the repeal of the Scott Act in the county of Chicoutimi and Saguenay, Quebec, and resulted in a majority of over 500 for repeal. There was a majority for repeal in almost every place. The Scott Act was adopted in Chicoutimi in 1885 by a vote of 1,157 to 528. It was never very well enforced, and lately has been entirely disregarded. HERNANDO AGAIN.—In the course of its report of a "racing machine" recently held in Winnipeg, the Free Press of that city reports that "Winnipeg, by Hernando, won the two-year-old stake race at Calgary, Alta., on the 19th inst., getting a record for the mile of 2:52. This is understood to be some fifteen seconds faster than any previous mile recorded as made by a two-year-old in Manitoba or the Territories and is a grand performance thus early in the season for so young a colt. It is a full sister to the handsome young mare, Ebergetta, (2:38) which her friends believe need only to be started right to enter the list."

DEATH OF JIM LOUIS.—James Mitchell, usually called Jim Louis, an old chief and captain of the Indians, died at Rocky Point at 10 o'clock this morning. He was the son of Louis Mitchell and was born at St. Andrew's on New Year's Day, 1802, where he was christened by Bishop McEachern. He has had eighteen children, only two of whom now survive—Alice and Louis. For a number of years he has been somewhat childish and on New Year's Day, 1894, he was the victim of the death of one of his sons, he wandered into the woods and was badly frozen. Since then he has been unable to leave his camp, where he has been faithfully nursed by his daughter Alice, whose appeals for bounty for "her dear father" are familiar to many in Charlottetown. His father was frozen to death in 1842, while on his way to New York City. James received the last rites of the Church before his death, and will be buried tomorrow at the South Shore. THE NEW CANADIAN CRUISER.—The crew for the new steel cruiser Aberdeen, expected from Scotland about 16th to enter commission here in the Canadian navy protection service, were formally shipped on Friday and immediately set sail on the steamer Barcelona for Liverpool, G. B., to join the Aberdeen and land here in Halifax, Captain McElinney, naval adviser of the Dominion government, will command the Aberdeen this voyage.
