THE Eastern Chronicle reports that a Mrs. Harris, of Cariboo, Pictou County, N. S., was so seriously gored by a bull, on Tuesday, that she has since died.

BLAIR ACQUITTED.—At Newark, N. J., on Wednesday, the jury in the case of Joseph A. Blair, for the murder of John Armstrong, his coachman, after being out 97 hours, brought in a verdict of not guilty, and the prisoner was discharged amid the cheers of the spectators.

SAYS the St. John Sun of yesterday: "There is a report current to the effect that a West-ireland merchant has been 'gone through' by a clerk to the extent of \$5,000 to \$6,000, the party officiating having gone West and established himself in a snug business."

AT Windsor Ont., on the 22nd inst., three masked men entered the residence of Mrs. Price, and stole a large amount of jewelry, money, etc. Mrs. Price's son attacked the burglars and was seriously shot in the left arm and in the breast during the fray.

PRICE, Blower Brown's trainer, won the twenty mile running match in New York, on the 21st inst., in two hours, eight minutes and three seconds. He made the first ten miles, in fifty-five minutes and fifty-five seconds, the fastest ten miles ever made in America.

A GENTLEMAN—a stranger in the city—on returning to his hotel from the fire on Thursday night remarked, "I never saw at midnight so great a number of well-dressed young men gazing on a burning building; they had everything on even to a high standing collar and colored necktie." NOTWITHSTANDING the disagreeable weather, the market yesterday was well attended. Sales brisk at the following prices: beef small, 4 to 10 cts.; do gr. 3 to 6 cts.; mutton from 4 to 8 cts.; lamb from 4 to 8 cts.; geese each from 40 to 50 cts.; ducks, per pair, from 40 to 35 cts. Chickens, from 30 to 45; butter, fresh, from 16 to 20 cts.; Eggs from 15 to 17 cts.; pork, carcass, from 5 1/2 to 6 cts.; potatoes from 18 to 20 cts.; hay per cwt. from 35 to 40 cts.; oats from 33 to 34 cts.

INSPECTOR KEER, of the Customs Department, made an important seizure of smuggled goods at Horton Landing, King's County, N. S., on Thursday last, consisting of 40 packages of goods brought from Boston on Sunday night in the schooner "Escort," Capt. Coffin. The schooner, which is owned by the captain and Messrs. F. & H. Brown, hardware merchants, Wolfville, was seized. Two vessels were also seized at Canning, King's Co., N. S., on Wednesday, for smuggling.

A LONG RACE.—It will be remembered, says the Port Hawksbury Beacon that last week we recorded the arrival of the brig Fanny, Capt. Murchinson, at this port. The Fanny left on Wednesday last, and on the evening of the same day, the Servian, another square-rigged brig, of which Capt. McDonald is commander, came into port and has been compelled to lie here the whole week, because of northerly winds. It appears that these two vessels have, during the past year and a half, been running one long race—and until one of the brigs leaves her present employ and goes into some other trade, it is probable that they will continue to chase each other in this persistent way. Up to their arrival in this port we are told that they are about ties, and no matter in which direction the rival vessels were destined to sail, the distance has been computed, and records compared when they again met, only to show that neither had the advantage. The first officer of the Servian is Mr. Charles E. McArthur, who was chief navigator, in former years, on board the Cuban man-of-war Virginia. The Servian and Fanny are owned by Messrs Welsh and Owen, of Charlottetown.
