HUNTER SELICK, whose tent has occupied a prominent position on Market Square for a few weeks during several summers past, is again on his rounds. This time his menagerie consists of a moose, ground hog and bull dog, the two first named being captured in the Quebec forest. He was in Newcastle, N. B., last week, and the Agents of that place had the following reference to him:—"He issued flaming posters, and had no brass band parade, but quietly told of his desperate struggle with the moose, while the ground hog and bull dog slept in the corner. THIS being the feast of Corpus Christi Pontifical High Mass was celebrated at the Cathedral by His Lordship, assisted by the Revs. J. C. McDonald, A. E. Burke, J. C. McLean and F. X. Gallant, as Assistant Priest, Deacon, Sub-Deacon and Master of Ceremonies, respectively. Father McLean preached a very appropriate sermon. At 8 o'clock mass Father Burke gave communion to a large number of boys and girls who were confirmed by the Bishop at 3 o'clock. Before administering the Sacrament of Confirmation His Lordship delivered an earnest exhortation to the children. He was assisted during the ceremony by the above mentioned clergymen. After Confirmation the children were enrolled in the confraternity of the Scapular by Fathers Gallant and Burke. The temperance pledge was administered to the boys in the morning.

Big Railway Scheme.

OTTAWA, June 8.
Mr. Kraper, representative of a syndicate of German capitalists, is here with a proposal to buy the Intercolonial, construct a bridge across the St. Lawrence at Quebec, and purchase the North Shore Line. He also proposes to establish iron smelting works at Pictou, and bring out 1,000 skilled German iron workers to introduce the German methods in the manufacture of iron and steel.

Parnell and Gladstone.

LONDON, June 8.
Parnell's conference with Morley and Sir Charles Russell resulted in adoption by the Irish leader of the Gladstonian tactics of opposition. The Gladstonian leaders will meet to-day, and go carefully over the amendments of the crimes bill and expunge all that are redundant.

Sad Drowning Accident.

MAQUOKETA, Iowa, June 8.
Five boys, three named Breck and two named Linckley, were drowned in the Maquoketa here yesterday. Three of them got beyond their depth when another boy jumped in to save them. Another noticing the failure of the first plunged in and all were drowned.

Mr. Blake's Resignation.

TORONTO, June 8.
The Globe this morning editorially announces the permanent retirement of the Hon. Edward Blake as Leader of the Opposition in the House of Commons. Ill health is the alleged reason for Mr. Blake's resignation.

Davitt's Speeches.

DUBLIN, June 8.
Michael Davitt made another speech at Bodyke to-day. He said he had received a letter from Mrs. Davitt intimating that if he was arrested she would speak at the evictions in his stead.

The Crimes' Bill.

LONDON, June 8.
The Unionists are all willing to support a proposal to substitute for the change of venue clause of the Crimes' Bill, a clause providing for trial by a commission of judges.

Children Burned to Death.

BRANTFORD, June 8.
The dwelling of A. Brown was consumed by fire this morning. Four small children aged nine, seven, five and three, were burned to death.

VIENNA, June 8.
The New Free Press says Askabad has been occupied by 26,000 Russian troops.

Prof. Hermann, the Predigateur, died to-day, aged 66.
