"Pleased to see Your Royal Highness," the waiter stammered. Then the two conversed a while.

A few minutes later some one asked the Prince if, in addition to inventing single-breasted frock coats he meant to introduce the innovation of shaking hands with the waiters. When the waiter was explained to him he said that he had mistaken the waiter for Mr. Choate. Then every one had a hearty laugh.
