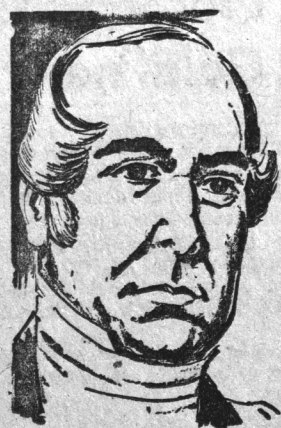
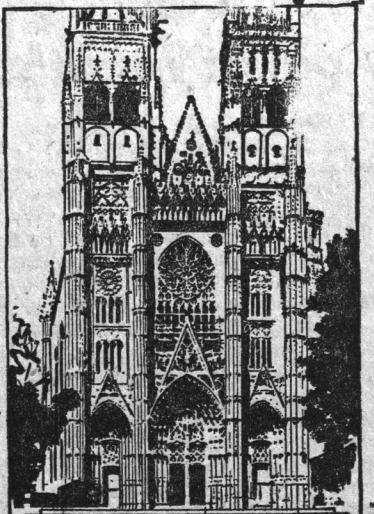


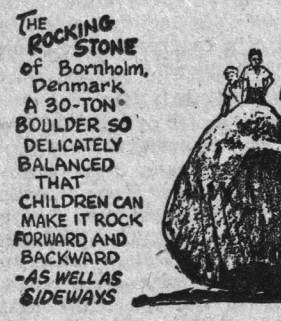

For several years now a battle has been raging in the upper echelons of bridge between advocates and antagonists of the weak notrump bid.

A small but earnest group of our top players contend that the best bidding results can be obtained if the requirements for an opening one notrump bid are lowered from the standard 16 to 19 points to 12 to 14 points.

The distributional requirements remain approximately the same but the strength-in-all-suits theory is necessarily abandoned since it is unusual to have all-around strength with only 12 to 14 points.

Not only does the weak notrump have this effect, but it also creates ripples which in turn affect other standard conceptions of bidding.

Forest Fire Fighters To Meet In Ont.

TORONTO (CP)—The men who lead the fight against fire in Canada's woodlands meet in Ontario next week to study the latest techniques in their trade.

Some 150 forestry experts from Canada and the United States are expected at the Second National Forest Fire Research Conference Aug. 6, 7 and 8 at the Ontario Forest Ranger School near Dorset, 112 miles northeast of Toronto.

F. A. Harrison of Montreal, general chairman of the conference sponsored by the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association, said at a press conference here Tuesday the project has three immediate aims:

To provide for exchange of information between forest fire authorities in Canada and the U.S.; to assess the current fire research situation and recommend improvements; to inform the public of nature and progress of research.

NEED APPARENT  
Need for the national conferences, inaugurated a year ago in New Brunswick, was indicated by Canada's record on forest fires. In 1956 there were 5,585 individual forest fires in the country.

T. E. Mackey, forest protection chief of the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests, reported that Ontario fire specialists will demonstrate almost every kind of fire fighting equipment at the conference.

Canadian speakers include A. F. Buell, Hull, Que.; D. A. Wolstenholme, New Brunswick Department of Lands and Forests, Campbellton, N.B. and J. M. Carnier, Beaulieu, Que.

Throws Away Her Crutches

WEST SPRINGFIELD, Mass. (AP)—Mrs. Patrick A. Corey, 59, recently returned from a visit to Ste. Anne de Beaupre Roman Catholic shrine in Quebec, walked Tuesday without the crutches he has used four years.

Mrs. Corey was injured Oct. 31, 1954, in an automobile accident at Battleboro, Vt. She suffered a crushed pelvis, broken toes, punctured bladder, compound fracture of the right hip and knee injuries.

In several operations a pin was placed in her left hip. Last year when the hip pin apparently failed to function, she underwent an operation for a plastic hip.

Her daughter, Mrs. Maire Verge, said that last Thursday at Ste. Anne's after 9 a.m. mass Mrs. Corey went into a trance.

WALKED TO URN  
"She wasn't carrying crutches the way you have to carry crutches when you're depending on them to help you walk. . . Then the crutches slipped out of her hands and when we got to the foot of the stairs, she walked over to an urn of holy water and splashed it in her face.

"By this time I was so excited I was crying. One of the brothers came along, Brother Bruno, and my mother said to him, 'I can walk brother. Thank St. Anne for me.' Then she got on her knees and kissed Brother Bruno's hand."
