## Municipalities Ask Voice In Inter-Government Talks

HALIFAX (CP) — Canada's cities, towns and villages want to be consulted in any upsurge of inter-government consultation.

This was the gist of a brief submitted to the provincial premiers' conference Monday by the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities.

Specifically, the brief asked:—Creation of inter-provincial committees representing the provinces and their municipalities to study various questions such as trade and industry, land use, transportation, housing, employment, education and social welfare.

—Distribution of reports from these studies to all concerned.

—Then a full provincial-municipal conference to discuss the reports.

## WANTS VIEWS SWAP

The federation seeks mainly a more thorough exchange of views between provincial and municipal leaders. The brief said in part:—The activities of both governments are dovetailed together, although not always with a mutual appreciation of the fact. What is needed on the provincial-municipal front is a practical working program of co-operation and the tools—legal, fiscal and administrative—necessary for the job.

Dealing with employment and general economic development, the federation said:—Whatever may be the future division of governmental responsibility for action, or the future

## COULD STRENGTHEN

Every step that can be taken to develop "a body of well-considered opinion" on these problems would not only improve government but be a step toward the strengthening of confederacy," the brief said.

Premier Stanfield of Nova Scotia, chairman of the premiers' conference, acknowledged receipt of the brief. But in a mid-day talk with reporters he did not indicate the confederacy attitude toward it.

The brief was signed by Mayor W. Akerley of neighboring Dartmouth, the federation president.

It noted that a secretariat for continuing federal-provincial consultation is in the making. This was one point emerging from an Ottawa conference 10 days ago.

The brief added that the premiers probably are considering setting up a continuing secretariat of their own to keep in closer touch.

## LEGAL BATTLE Seen Lengthy In B.C. Power

VANCOUVER (CP) — The provincial government's 51g B.C. Hydro and Power Authority was termed non-existent in British Columbia's Supreme Court Monday and the men running it were described as "trespassers."

The assertions were made by Douglas McK. Brown, counsel for B.C. Power Corporation and B.C. Electric in objecting to a government motion for stay of proceedings in the tangled issue of ownership.

The authority seeks to have the stay put on any action by B.C. Power to take back and operate the giant B.C.E. power, gas and transportation utility.

The proceeding by B.C.E.'s parent company, B.C. Power, stems from the judgment last week by Chief Justice Sherwood Lett declaring the Aug. 1, 1961, appropriation of B.C.E. by the provincial government as constitutionally invalid.

No matter what the outcome, the losing side will take the case to the Supreme Court of Canada.

## Court Justice Reported Wed

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) — Associate Justice William O. Douglas of U.S. Supreme Court, 84, Monday married a woman in her mid-20s, a spokesman for the justice's office said.

Douglas, twice divorced, and Joan Martin of suburban Amherst, a recent college graduate, were married in Buffalo's Unitarian Universalist Church in a noon ceremony.

The spokesman for the Martin family said Miss Martin is about 25 and formerly worked in Washington for the Agency for International Development.

The couple left for a month's camping and hiking trip in the mountains of Montana and Washington, the spokesman said.

The Buffalo News, which originally disclosed the marriage, says Miss Martin graduated last year from Allegheny College, Meadville, Pa.

An uncorroborated divorce was granted last week in Golden, Colo., to Douglas and Mrs. Douglas, 48, from Douglas on grounds of cruelty.

Mrs. Douglas announced the divorce proceeding last April.

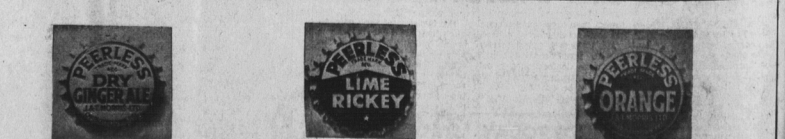
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
