

Iola Henley Winner Of Free For All Pace

Takes Two Heats Of Feature Event; Lucky Chief Wins Other Heat

Iola Henley, the great pacing daughter of Peter Henley, won the Free For All Pace last night in the opening meet of the Old Home Week racing program at the Charlottetown Driving Park before a crowd of approximately 3,000 fans.

The sleek brown mare, owned and trained by Clayton MacLeod of Westville, Nova Scotia, won the first heat by a good three lengths, placed sixth to P. J. Cadeagan's Lucky Chief in the second heat and then came back to outrace Lucky Chief in the third and deciding heat.

The veteran campaigner, who has won many outstanding victories on the Truro Race Track, showed plenty of brush in the stretch to win the third heat by half a length over Lucky Chief in the best track battle of the night.

Lucky Chief turned in the best time of the meet as Rennie MacDonald took him under the wire in 2:08 2/5 in the second heat. Iola's times were 2:08 3/5 and 2:09 flat.

Prince Maplecroft set the pace for nearly the first half mile of the opening heat followed by Iola Henley and Handbook on the outside. Handbook went into the lead at the half and held it until the three-quarter mark when Iola started her last quarter dash.

Clayton MacLeod took Iola to the top between the three-quarter pole and the upper turn. She opened up a good lead and finished the mile about three lengths ahead of the second place Lucky Chief.

Lucky Chief went away in second position in the second heat and Rennie MacDonald had him in the lead at the first turn followed by Handbook and Prince Maplecroft.

As they went past the quarter pole it was Lucky Chief, Prince Maplecroft, Iola Henley and Handbook in that order and they maintained that order until the finish wire. Iola Henley was set back to sixth position for interference on the first turn.

The lead changed hands three times in the third heat. Iola Henley went to the top from sixth position going away but Lucky Chief moved into the lead before they hit the quarter mile mark.

As they went past the half it was Lucky Chief, Iola Henley, Handbook, Prince Maplecroft and Handbook. Lucky Chief led around to the top of the stretch when Iola put on her stretch drive.

Lucky Chief went into the stretch with a lead of one length but Iola came on to overtake him and win by half a length at the wire. Handbook Chief finished third.

Bud's Echo, the improving young trotter owned by Ralph MacFadyen and driven by Elmer Smith won two heats of the 225 trot and placed second in the other. Helen Harvester won the second heat of the trot after Bud's Echo was set back one position for running in the stretch.

Bud's Echo was an easy winner in the first race as young Smith took him away in the lead and

held him there to the finish wire. Frisco the Great driven by Don MacNeill, challenged but could not come within a length of the winning horse.

Again Bud's Echo showed the way in his second heat followed by Helen Harvester and Roma Budlong. Helen Harvester moved up to challenge at the upper turn on the last trip around and both horses battled it out down the stretch. Bud's Echo broke about 90 yards from the wire and although he finished a half length ahead was set back one position.

In the third heat Bud's Echo went away on the rail and led from wire to wire. Chet Lyn Clever, driven by Col. D. A. MacKinnon was second at the half with Colonel Budlong third and Roma Budlong finished second.

Adam's Orphan, owned and driven by Duncan MacDonald of Sydney and Rosalie H. split the honors in the Classified Pace.

Adam's Orphan took the first dash after moving up from fourth position at the half. Follow up Jr. led the field for more than the first three-quarters of the mile followed by Jerry Lee Volo and Mason's 49.

Adam's Orphan followed by Dale D. moved up on the upper turn and finished one-two under the wire.

The race was marred by an accident involving Sleepy Sam and Mason's 49 on the upper turn. Both drivers were thrown from their sulkeys and Laurie O'Brien, the driver of Mason's 49 injured his back.

O'Brien drove the second dash but almost blacked out during the mile. He received medical attention following the race and was taken to hospital for further examination and observation.

Rosalie H. came up from fourth position on the upper turn to finish with a burst and win the second dash by half a length over Dale D. Mason's 49 finished third but was set back to fifth place for interference.

The daily double on Iola Henley and Adam's Orphan paid \$56.90.

Hockey player Bob Gray was runner-up with a score of 157.

Noted Drivers At Exhibition

Leading driver in the Charlottetown track in 1952 and having a brilliant record thus far in 1953, Len O'Meara, has also the largest number of horses in charge of any trainer at the Ch'town Driving Park.

Under his care are horses from Dr. Temple Hooper's stable; the horses owned by Mrs. Poulton, those owned by Gregory & MacLean, and the pacer, Buddy O'Connor, racing under the colors of Mr. Winston Taylor.

Dr. Hooper's horses include such well-known starters as Rosalie H. and Billie McVey; the Poulton stable lists among others the fast stepping Esso, given a mark of 2:11 1/5 by O'Meara. For Messrs. Gregory and MacLean he is piloting Royal Scott Jr.

Len had one of the greatest thrills of his career a few weeks ago when he won five of eight dashes at a night meet. He ran up his five victories, by teaming Babe Britton home in front, twice, was also a double winner with Rosalie H., and got the nod once with Royal Scott Jr.

Len drove his first race in 1940, and scored his early victories with June French, an imported mare. With this horse he won seven heats in 2:10.

With A. B. Cutcliffe's Margaret Jean, an Island bred horse, he had further successes, and gave her a mark of 2:10.

This year he added to his reputation when he gave the twelve year old Babe Britton a new record of 2:08 1/5. His work with the Britton horse has in fact, been remarkable, and one of the highlights of Island racing this year.

Len will be one of the most active drivers at the present meet.

Making a comeback to racing this year after a lengthy absence from horse circles, Pat MacKenna, prominent and youthful driver in the late twenties and early thirties, is displaying much of his former ability as trainer and driver.

Pat, still far from elderly, has retained his fine sense of timing and the gift of being able to "rate" a horse to a nicety. It was this capacity to judge a horse's stamina that made him one of the best drivers in the Maritimes twenty years ago.

It was tough racing in the 1920's and 1930's and Pat had his share of victories. He had the distinction of beating the great Marjorie M. at Montague in 2:10 with Billy Cope, and had the Cope horse topping the summaries on many other Maritime tracks.

Another great pacer of twenty years ago, Lucky Lindy, owned by Wellington MacNeill, raced to brilliant wins under Pat's guidance and took a tab at 2:09 1/4.

At Halifax, Fredericton, Woodstock and Chatham as well as on Island tracks, MacKenna was highly regarded and seldom out of the money.

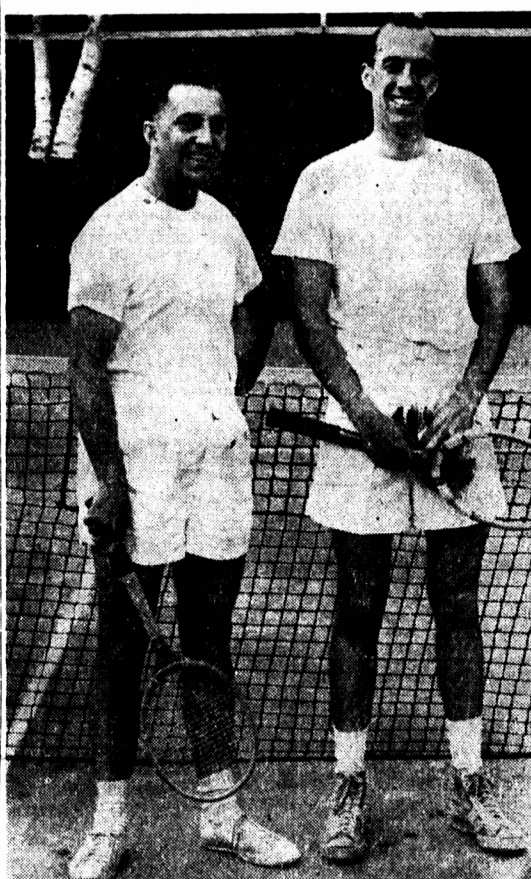

SOUTH MARCH, Ont. (CP)—Maritime marksmen showed up well Monday despite poor shooting conditions at the 85th annual Dominion of Canada Rifle Association prize shoot on the Connaught rifle ranges.

Two Nova Scotians led the Maritimers in the tyro match, firing 10 rounds from the 200 yard range. CPO, D. Clark of Dartmouth, N.S., and Elsie Strong of Newport, N.E., posted scores of 49 of a possible 50.

Five other Maritimers were tied with scores of 48. They were: S. J. MacAdam of Saint John, N. B.; E. Douglas, Moncton; G. E. Tutts, Fredericton; Cnr. A. L. Court, York, P.E.I.; and Lieut. W. Warshick, Summerside, P.E.I.

Two of the opening day matches, the Barlow and the MacDougall matches, were postponed because

of a heavy downpour of rain that covered these ranges near Ottawa all day.

Qualifying Round In Canadian Open Golf

LONDON, Ont. (CP)—Pat Lesser, bespectacled sharpshooter from Seattle, shot a par 77 here Monday to lead the qualifying round of the Canadian Open golf championship. The tough Hunt Club course floored many likely-looking prospects as the six-day title tournament opened.

One of the better United States players in the tournament, Miss Lesser shot a two-over 41 going out but came home with a blazing 36 on the back nine, two-under, to equal the 77 par for the layout.

While the course proved really rough for some of the contestants the top players weren't far off the pace. Canada's Marlene Stewart, winner of the close tournament here last week and British champion, posted a one-over 78 after a scrambling opening nine. She shared second spot with four U. S. stars, Edean Anderson, from Helena, Montana, defending champion, Grace Lenzyk, a two-time champ, and Barbara Romack of Sacramento, Calif.

The top 32 scorers go into match play for the championship today. The rest of the field will battle it out in the several flights. The tournament runs through Saturday, when a 36-hole match play duel will be staged for the title.

The scores were higher than normal as the field of 130 battled it out for championship flight spots.
