Hall Returns To Chicago

DETROIT (AP) — Veteran goaltender Glenn Hall has agreed to return from retirement to Chicago Black Hawks, the National Hockey League team's coach said Saturday night.

Billy Reay said the 36-year-old Hall will report to the Hawks sometime this week. "Hall doesn't take very long to get in shape," Reay said. "He'll take two days."

Hall, who for the last nine years has been a member of the NHL's first or second all-star teams, could be expected to replace Dennis DeJordy as goalie with the Hawks DeJordy started in the nets Saturday night when the Hawks defeated Detroit Red Wings 7-4.

Hall could not be reached for comment on why he changed his mind after announcing his retirement from hockey.

"When he announced his retirement a month ago Hall said he definitely would not return despite repeated offers of salary increases."

Winn. Ends Lions' Hopes Argos Erupt Crush Riders

WINNIPEG (CP) — Winnipeg Blue Bombers clipped British Columbia Lions 16-7 Sunday to clinch a Western Football Conference playoff berth.

The Bombers kept 16,772 wind-chilled fans cheerful in 30-degree temperatures by shattering B.C. playoff hopes.

A 12-point outburst in the third quarter, including a Lions' giveaway of two safety touches, proved the difference in a tough defensive class.

Noel Dundorf, Winnipeg's Canadian end, was the big gun although he handled the ball just once. He caught Kenny Ploen's pass into the end zone from the B.C. one-yard line at 9:07 of the third quarter.

Norm Wilson kicked a 19-yard field goal, a single and a convert and Ed Ulmer, kicking as he was being tackled, boomed a 70-yard punt for a single to complete Bombers' scoring.

Lions, held to 187 yards and nine first downs, got a touch-

down from Willie Fleming and a single from Bill Mitchell.

Dave Rainey was the power for Winnipeg's offence, which produced 19 first downs on 186 yards rushing and 95 passing, bringing his season's total to 11,550.

Marty Rosen, his halfback partner, played a fine game on defence and chipped in a 29-yard pass reception that set up Dundorf's touchdown.

TORONTO (CP) — Toronto Argonauts ended their 1966 Eastern Football Conference home season Sunday with an explosive 35-12 victory over the league-leading Ottawa Rough Riders.

The Argonaut victory had a negligible effect on the standings since Ottawa clinched first place last week while the Argonauts cannot get out of the cellar for the fifth consecutive season.

The victory was Toronto's fourth against nine losses. Rough Riders suffered only their second loss.

While Riders did not look like the club that has been the class of the four-team conference this year, Argonauts made probably their best showing.

Halftime score was 13-6 for Toronto and gave no suggestion of the power Argos would unleash in the second half.

Halfback Larry Ferguson showed the way with two touchdowns, one on a 75-yard gallop and the other on a 41-yard pass from rookie Wally Gebler.

Gabler combined with end Al Irwin for another 75-yard pass-and-run touchdown play while veteran quarterback Eagle Day, used sparingly, threw 19 yards to Bobby Taylor for the other Toronto touchdown.

John Vilnus kicked two field goals and a pair of converts and Dave Mann's three booming singles rounding out Toronto scoring.

Ottawa was confined to two field goals by Moe Rees in the first quarter and a last-quarter TD by Jim Dillard on a four-yard run.

The TiCats now will meet Shearwater Navy next Sunday in Dartmouth, N.S. in a sudden-death game for the right to meet Halifax Buccaneers in the Purdy Cup.

Saint John — Lancaster went ahead 16-6 before 4,000 fans in the first half, then its defence held Dartmouth to 30 yards in the second half.

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson remained Friday the lone but minor hurdle in the proposed merger plans of the American and National football leagues.

The nation's two major professional leagues, however, will probably put the machinery in high gear immediately for the world championship game in January — first step in the merger — because Johnson almost certainly will sign the football bill passed by Congress.

The Senate, with only six members present, approved the bill allowing limited exemption to anti-trust laws Friday on a voice vote. The measure was passed Thursday night by the House where most of the opposition lay.

The legislation now goes to Johnson for his signature which appears to be a formality since the measure is a rider on the administration's anti-inflation tax bill which the President signed last week.

No date has been set for the signing, but the measure will not physically reach the White House before next week. It is also doubtful that Johnson would sign the bill before he returns from his Asian tour Nov. 3.

The bill, in addition to setting the stage for the world championship game—most likely to be held Jan. 2—will allow the leagues to combine into one 34-team operation and expand possibly to 26 by 1970.

A key provision in the legislation will permit the two leagues to hold a common draft and thus eliminate the bidding and paying of high bonuses and salaries to untried college players.

The bill extends to high school football games on Friday nights the same protection the colleges now have against televised professional football games on Saturdays.

While the provision specifically refers only to league contracts, sponsors of the bill said it was also intended to cover television agreements by individual teams.

It would prohibit league contracts for the telecasting of pre games within 75 miles of a high school or college game played after 6 p.m. between the second Friday in September and the second Saturday in December.

U.S. Cops Women's World Golf Championship Sunday

MEXICO CITY (AP) — The United States survived the loss of seven strokes on two closing holes and led by 17-year-old Shelley Hamlin of Fresno, Calif., best closest challenger by nine shots for the women's world's amateur golf championship. France, the defending champion, was third.
