### THOUGHTS FOR OUR TIME

BY HIS EMINENCE CARDINAL MCGUIGAN

**DUTY OF ALL CANADIANS TO COMBAT PREJUDICE**  
An encouraging sign of social maturity in the Canada of our day is the growing desire of those who belong to differing racial and religious groups to work toward a deeper understanding of and so a more fruitful co-operation with one another.  
Divine Providence is fashioning of Canada a country of many ethnic groups each with a distinctive manner of life and culture, and of many religious groups, and the Canada of the generations to come will be molded—is being molded now—by the justice and charity which these ethnic and religious groups practice in their relations with one another.  
Two generations ago, the energies of many were being expended in forming groups and organizing activities which were divisive in character, intended to "protect" the imagined rights of a racial or religious group by the suppression or limitation of the rights of other groups.  
Now, in increasing numbers, Canadians are joining to investigate forces in which such destructive forces as "anti-Semitism," "anti-Catholicism," and "anti-Protestantism" can be rooted out of our common way of life. While admitting and respecting the differences among races and nationalities and religious convictions, we are struggling now to find areas in which we can co-operate, and to uproot, once and for all, the irrational prejudices which can threaten a multi-racial society such as ours.  
Unfortunately, however, it can happen that what we heartily approve and support on a social or organizational level we refuse to practise on a personal level. Yet it is not as organizations or clubs that we contact members of nationalities, races or creeds other

than our own; it is as persons, individuals. It is not as organizations that we acquire an emotional attitude, bias, or prejudice against the new Canadian, or Jew or Catholic or Protestant; it is as persons.  
**GUIDED BY CHARITY**  
And as persons we must train ourselves to judge others, not on the basis of emotional reactions conditioned by our own sometimes narrow and bigoted environment. We must make our judgments, guided by the virtues of absolute justice and generous and understanding charity.  
This is not easy for most of us. All, to some extent at least, have been conditioned by antipathies to members of a race, nationality, or creed, antipathies festering sometimes for generations. But as we mature as persons and as a nation we must acquire the habits of honesty of thought in suppressing those irrational prejudices.  
The home is the training ground of virtue, and this is especially true in the development of the virtues of good citizenship, the growth of respect for and toleration—in the best sense—of the members of other races and religions. And this training in justice and charity is not effected by lectures to the child; like the virtue of religion, these virtues "are more caught than taught."  
The father who controls his impulse to use those terms of reproach which are applied in scorn to certain nationalities is contributing to citizenship. When events of the day are discussed around the dinner table, the parents must try to make their judgments of these events, not on the basis of he nationality or creed of the persons involved, but on the basis of the nature of the events themselves.  
**ALL HAVE FAILINGS**  
This must be the practice particularly in the case of the reports of crime. No national group is without its sinners, and no national group is without its saints; but it is as human beings that we grow to sanctify, not as French, or English, or Slavs, or Irish.  
The attitudes of our children to new-Canadians, to those of races and creeds other than their own,

is conditioned by such things as a mother's fear that a family of "foreign" birth is moving in next door, or the father's resentment at the promotion of an adherent of another faith to a position of prominence in the firm.  
Often we may rightfully feel fear or resentment, but it must not be on the basis of the nationality or the religion, but on the undesirable qualities of individuals. And any tendency of children to condemn or to slight an individual or a group simply because of race or religion should be quickly and firmly checked, with an explanation adapted to their years.  
We have much for which to be grateful in this Canada that God has given us; not least for the laws which guarantee the political and religious freedom of us all. We have the obligation, in our gratitude, by an awareness of these virtues of justice and charity, to make these laws a living expression of our own personal attitude, and to guide our children to maturity, free from the blight of racial or religious intolerance.

### At West Coast Oil Slows Down

VANCOUVER (CP) — Alberta crude oil exports from this port have dwindled to a trickle since the end of the Suez Canal crisis. The oil movement reached a peak during the crisis, but in the last couple of months only five tankers are expected to continue to September, with only one tanker scheduled to load for Japan meanwhile.  
United States Pacific ports began to stockpile Alberta crude during the canal closure and now they have enough on hand for several months' requirements.  
Further more, shipments of crude from Kuwait in the Persian Gulf are arriving in large volume at California refineries.  
Reopening of the canal caused an immediate slump in tanker charter rates, so it is once again profitable to ship oil all the way from the Persian Gulf to U.S. ports in super-tankers on long-term charter.  
Kuwait oil can thus be delivered to refineries cheaper than Alberta oil despite the much longer haul

However, Persian Gulf supplies are subject to a voluntary import quota in the U.S. to protect domestic wells.

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP)—Dr. Samuel A. Visanska, 88, credited with changing the shape of the baby diaper from a triangle to an oblong, died Thursday at his home. His theory of changing the standard method of folding diapers was proposed in 1915 and was described as "a great benefit to the baby and a boon for the mother."
