NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

BERLIN, Dec. 17. The Cologne "Gazette" confirms the rumor of the proposed cession of Crete to Germany.

DUBLIN, Dec. 17. The master of the Kilmurrie Harriers has received notice from the Land Leaguers of their intention to Boycott him.

LONDON, Dec. 17. The "Daily Telegraph" says that the Government contemplates proclaiming martial law in the disturbed districts of Ireland.

PORTSMOUTH, Dec. 17. The iron screw troopship "Assistance," which is about to undergo refitting, has been ordered to be in readiness to proceed within 12 hours notice on a special voyage to Ireland.

LONDON, Dec. 17. The Duchess of Westminster, a daughter of the Second Duke of Sutherland, and Mistress of the Robes to the Queen, is sinking fast. Her death is only a question of a few hours.

LONDON, Dec. 17. Mr. Wm. Bouce Jones, who has been made a victim of "Boycotting," writes to the Times as follows: "I am getting some resolute men from a distance, well armed, to replace the laborers who have left. Two policemen sleep in the house, and four others are stationed near my farm. I have applied for more protection, and troops are promised me on Friday."

Mr. Hartland, a Conservative, was today declared to be a member of the House for Evesham. After the last general election Mr. Estoliffe, Liberal, was unseated on petition for bribery. Subsequently Mr. Lehmann, Liberal, was elected by 378 votes against 376 votes for Mr. Dixon Hartland. Mr. Hartland claimed the seat, with the result that Mr. Lehmann was unseated for bribery. A scrutiny of the ballot resulted in the seating of Mr. Hartland.

A despatch from Cork to the Times says: "There is a great want of employment throughout the country, owing to the disinclination of landlords to lay out money. At several meetings held, farmers were summoned to give employment to laborers. The agent of the Earl of Cork was requested to provide labor on the Earl's estate near Charleville, County Cork, and he has just intimated that he will order work in that locality and give employment until March, 1881."

The Times, in its leading article on the Irish question, this morning, says: "The followers of the Government are embarrassed, and for the most part do not know what to say, while a few are bold enough to express their regret at the line their leaders have pursued." Mr. Whitehead, one of the most respected Liberals in the House of Commons, speaking at Bedford, last night, described vividly the reign of terror that had left no honest calling safe in a large part of Ireland, and avowed his feeling that the time had arrived when the Government might be compelled to use coercion. The writer then proceeds: "There have been Liberal Governments before the present Government, embarrassed by Irish difficulties; but they have not been slack to do what they could to assert the authority of the law. The contrast between the spirit of those times and the spirit prevailing now is little to the credit of the Government or to that of the present generation. One of the worst evils consequent on the Government's attitude is the effect it must have on the popular reception in Ireland of their remedial legislation. It should be received as a satisfaction of justice, but it is too probable that it will be received as a concession to the lawlessness with which the Government did not venture to grapple. If arbitrary demands are not granted in the form in which they have been made, it will still be said that what is given is the result of the demonstration of the irresistible power of a people determined to have their own way. The most false and foolish notions will be thus confirmed in the brain of the Irish peasant. The shortcoming of the Government thus threatens us with a recurrence of difficulties in the future, for their conduct will encourage a repetition of the tactics with which they have not ventured to grapple."

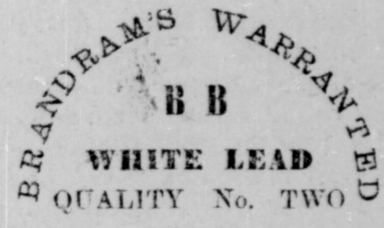
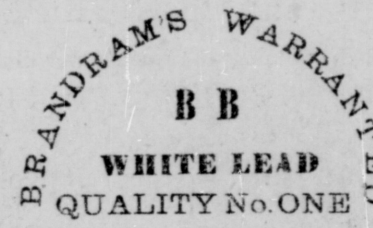
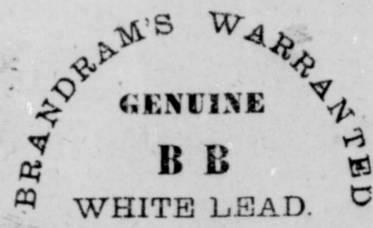
