House of Commons.

WARRANT FOR QUEBEC WEST.

Ananias Cameron Again.

OTTAWA, Aug. 19. In the House yesterday the Speaker reported that he had received Thomas McGreevy's resignation as a member, and had issued a warrant for the issue of a writ for election. Several members objected to the Speaker's course, as McGreevy's seat being contested, he could not resign.

The Speaker said he had no option under law. Sir John Thompson said the matter would be required into and the provisions of the law obeyed. Ananias Cameron made charges against Cochrane, member for East Northumberland, that he had received money in consideration of recommending certain persons to offices. The charges will be considered to-day.

Sir Richard Cartwright tabled a motion regarding procedure before the Public Accounts Committee. Sir John Thompson accepted the motion, and demanded that there should be no fishing for evidence in committee, and that charges against Ministers should be made in the House.

The motion carried. More revelations regarding Mercier's booting are expected to-day.

THE QUEBEC STEAL

Mercier Got the Money.

Wanted False Entries Made.

OTTAWA, Aug. 20.

In the Senate Railway Committee yesterday it was proved that Mercier, before leaving for Europe, had borrowed five thousand dollars from the bank, which was afterwards paid out of the hundred thousand dollars steal, and that another five thousand was remitted to him to Paris.

Evidence traced directly through the bank books the application of the whole hundred thousand dollars showed to have been paid in first to Pacaud's credit and then checked out by him to retire promissory notes on which Mercier, Tarte, Senator Pelletier and Charles Langelier, invariably appeared as endorsers. A promissory note of Tarte's was also taken up.

Mr. Webb, local agent of the Union Bank, testified that Pacaud had proposed to him to make a certain set of entries regarding the steal which would not have truly represented the transactions. He wanted bogus entries made in the bank's books, but was refused.

PUBLIC ACCOUNTS ENQUIRY.

Another Grit in Trouble.

More Officials Dealt With.

OTTAWA, Aug. 20.

In the public accounts committee, Bronskill, superintendent of stationery, admitted receiving presents of money from paper manufacturers from whom he purchased paper. Bronskill is a notorious grit, having been on the Free Press staff here. He was a most over-bearing, insolent fellow, and was very impertinent before the committee. He was promptly dismissed.

Yesterday afternoon Johnson, manager of the Toronto type foundry, denied having paid Senecal, Superintendent of the Printing Co., sums on purchase, but had occasionally lent him money, as a friend, when he was hard up. Senecal was immediately suspended.

Arnoldi has been dismissed from the service.

THE TARTE-McGREEVY CASE

Sir Hector's Second Statement.

He Contradicts Starrs' Evidence.

OTTAWA, Aug. 20.

In the Tarte-McGreevy committee Edgar was asked if he had searched for the letter written him by Capt. Larkin, remonstrating against the course of the Globe regarding the Esquimaux dock.

Edgar said that sickness had prevented him, but as he did not keep such letters, he had no hope of finding it. Sir Hector asked to be permitted to make a statement to Starrs' testimony. He contradicted it fully, and produced documentary evidence to show that Starrs was astray and that the conversation alleged could not have taken place.

(Fisheries Intelligence Bureau Report.)

HALIFAX, Aug. 20.—Quebec—Cod fishing fair at Long Point, Sheldrake, Moise, Grand River and Newport Point. Poor at Perce and none at all at Seven Islands. Lance very good at Long Point and Seven Islands. Good at Sheldrake and Moise. Herring fair at Newport Point.

New Brunswick—Codfishing still reported very good off Miscou. On the North Lake herring, mackerel and sardines good. At Campobello cod, haddock and halibut fair. At Magdalen Islands mackerel fishing very good and cod good.

P. E. Island—Mackerel still taking hooks freely at Killbuck and Alberton. Hake plentiful at Malpeque and Georgetown. Cod fair at Malpeque.

Cape Breton—Fisheries very dull all over the coast. One quintal of cod per boat at Louisburg, and some mackerel taking hooks at St. Peters.

Nova Scotia—Shore codfishing good, and mackerel fair at Lunenburg. Mackerel schooling and taking hooks freely. Lobster bait at Pubnico Harbor. Hake, haddock, cod, herring and mackerel fair at Digby. Cod fishing fair all last week at Cape Sable. Bit squid fair at Grand River and Newport Point, Que, and very plentiful off Miscou. Small quantity of mackerel and herring bait in traps at Pubnico and Johns Island, N. S.
