UNFAIR POTATO

(Continued from Page 5)

States despite a Canadian embargo on the shipment of table stock across the border. It is only a few years ago that the United States was glad to have 9,000,000 bushels of our 1944 crop but this, of course was before the full impact of price support production made itself felt. To show the historic character of our exports of potatoes to the United States, I need only refer to a six-year period commencing with the 1926 crop when our average shipments across the border amounted to nearly 4,500,000 bushels. The highest figure in this period was about 5,400,000 and the lowest 1,900,000 bushels.

False, Misleading "I am laboring these figures simply to show how false and misleading is the statement that 1949 exports to the United States were '88 times the annual average before the era of our (the U.S.A.) government's farm price supports'."

"Of Canadian exports of potatoes to the United States, certified seed potatoes constitute the more stable trade. Our certified seed is in strong demand because of its comparative freedom from disease and also for its vigorous reproductive capacity. Canadian certified seed potatoes are purchased by producers in practically every state in the Union."

"In the last 10 years, more than 60 per cent of our potato exports have been of certified seed, desired in order to maintain quality and quantity production in American potato fields. The table stock exports in this period averaged less than 40 per cent, or 1,600,000 bushels. United States production in this same period averaged 412,000,000 bushels, so that imports of Canadian table potatoes amounted to considerably less than half of one per cent."

"If it is not considered fair to deal in averages, let me use the figures of the 1949 crop. In this case the 470,000 bushels of Canadian table potatoes entering the United States is still considerably less than one per cent of the United States' 412,000,000 bushel crop. "There is, then, a 10-year average movement of table stock potatoes amounting to less than half of one per cent of American production, and last season's shipments amounting to less than one per cent of American 1949 production, and yet Canadian potatoes are blamed for the ruination of the United States' potato grower."

Canadian table potatoes concerned.

"This potato movement is not a one-way traffic by any means as Canadians normally import about three-quarters of a million bushels of potatoes from the United States. In the winter and spring of 1945-46, however, we imported more than 2,000,000 bushels and two years earlier imported about 1,300,000 bushels. Imports in the post-war years, following the 1945 crop year, have averaged about 600,000 bushels, mostly high-priced early potatoes in the summer months."

U.S. Consumption Down "Of the considerations affecting the present potato situation in the United States, some of the more important deserve consideration. It is of real significance that, in the last 20 years, consumption of potatoes in the United States has fallen off by 20 per cent, that is to say, from 135 pounds per capita to 108 pounds. If consumption had not been reduced so seriously, potato producers in that country would be hard put to meet the demands of a rapidly increasing population."

"The main source of complaint and propaganda against the importation of Canadian potatoes is Aroostook County in the State of Maine, just across the river from New Brunswick's famous St. John River Valley. Aroostook County produced 85 per cent of the potatoes grown in the State of Maine and has, quite justly, an important voice in potato affairs. However, producers of that county do not proclaim the methods by which they have circumvented efforts of the control authorities to keep production to a realistic figure. When acreage allotments were reduced, the good farmers of Aroostook County simply spaced their potato rows closer together, and to be doubly sure planted the seed more closely in the rows."

"Ten years ago the yield of potatoes in Maine was about 265 bushels to the acre. For the last two years it has been 450 bushels to the acre. Closer planting is not entirely responsible for this increase, for full advantage has been taken of heavy applications of fertilizer, as well as the use of D. D. T. for pest control. One has only to drive through Aroostook County and note the new storages and farm homes to realize that the potato producer is not doing badly."

"In New Brunswick, by way of comparison, yield per acre has been more than 200 bushels since 1930 but there has been no attempt to follow the example of Maine, as only once has per-acre yield been more than 300 bushels. In our sister province of Prince Edward Island it has not even reached that figure."

Charge Refuted "The charge is made that Canada increases her potato acreage every time the United States department of agriculture reduced acreage goals in the United States. This mis-statement is easily refuted. In the last five years, the yearly average number of acres sown to potatoes has been 513,100, the figures for the last three seasons being 508,510 and 505,000. "In the previous decade, 1931 to 1940, the average was 533,600 acres. It is clear that the trend has been downward, and this is confirmed by acreage figures for New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, the two provinces chiefly concerned in United States trade, where the 116,100 acres of 1948 dropped to 110,800 in 1949 and are further reduced to 105,000 this year."

"The long-time mean production goal for potatoes in the United States has been 350,000,000 bushels. When United States production falls below this figure, the United States tariff provides that imports from Canada may cover the short fall at half the regular rate of duty. At least this has been the law for many years, until Canada agreed last winter to a voluntary reduction of this figure to 335,000,000 bushels when the United States department of agriculture set its production goal at this lesser amount. "It seems clear enough that the United States has subsidized its potato industry too heavily, as production has been maintained at more than 400,000,000 bushels for five of the last six years. With lessened per-capita consumption, the government has had to purchase millions of bushels and remove them from the domestic market. The government has endeavored to dispose of some of these, and there's the rub."

dislocate trade completely, so the plan was evolved of selling to markets that are not normally supplied, and at a price of one cent per 100-pound bag at the inland shipping point in Maine. Several million bushels were sold at this give-away price, virtually stopping Canadian table stock sales to regular markets in Venezuela and Panama. This program also prevented sales of table stock potatoes to certain European markets such as Portugal, to which country I myself have made heavy shipments in the past. "It appears there is agitation by United States politicians that the so-called 'escape clause' of the general agreement on tariff and trade be evoked to place an embargo against imports of Canadian seed and table potatoes. If the importation of Canadian certified seed and table stock potatoes, amounting in net figures (imports less exports) to less than two per cent of United States production can so utterly demoralize the economy of that country that it endeavors to abrogate the spirit of the Geneva Charter, then it is high time for Canadian authorities to review the whole picture of our trade with the United States of America."
