**PRODUCE SHIPMENTS.**—The *Landamia* cleared for St. John's, Nfld., to-day, with 1600 bushels oats, 574 do turnips, 1290 do potatoes, 17 bundles hay, 65 quarters beef, 40 sheep, 10 carcasses mutton, 125 geese, 30 turkeys, 991 bushels barley, 21 barrels parsnips, 7 do beets, 6 do, shipped by D. McMillan and H. Longworth. And the *Freddie*, Halifax, 899 bushels potatoes, 570 do oats, 60 do turnips by McMillan. The *River Queen* cleared from Cardigan, yesterday, for Nfld, 3020 bush. potatoes, 10 do turnips, shipped by O. Connolly.

3. Duties to be levied on all Foreign manufactures and products imported into Great Britain or any of the colonies.

Federation at the Cape of Good Hope.

In Cape Colony, says the *London Post*, the federation principle has become more popular since it was first mooted, whilst in the Orange River Free State it was from the outset accepted with favor. The inhabitants of the Republic have not been so well affected to it since the forcible annexation of the Transvaal justifiable as that measure was, and since the occurrence of complications with the natives; but the conclusion of peace, and the evident desire on our part to promote the prosperity of the Transvaal, will doubtless soon create as warm a feeling as ever, and the Free State will not be an obstacle to a step of such general benefit to South Africa. Although for some months to come no legislative action can be taken for forwarding confederation, still during the recess of the Cape Parliament much may be done towards the proposed end. On the 25th February Sir Michael Hicks Beach suggested that a conference of delegates from the various South African Provinces should be held at Cape Town, and this might be very well carried out now, when the whole question could be calmly discussed, difficulties talked of, and remedies suggested, with a distinct plan of operations agreed upon ere another Parliament sitting at Cape Town can assume the initiative in actively taking the work in hand.

**THE STORM IN NOVA SCOTIA**  
Immense Loss of Shipping.

Special despatch to Examiner.

HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 31.

Telegraphic communication, which has been interrupted during the past two days by the terrible gale which swept over the eastern part of Nova Scotia, was restored last evening, when accounts were received of the the greatest loss of shipping and damage to property which has occurred for years. At Guys-boro four schooners are ashore. Two of them are total wrecks and the others are badly damaged. At Cape Canso twenty schooners are ashore and more or less damaged. Several of them will prove total wrecks. Schooner "Reliance" is a total wreck at Cross Harbor. In the Strait of Canso a three masted fore and aft schooner is ashore on Bear Island. At White Haven Harbor there are thirteen schooners ashore, the names and damages unknown. At Glasgow Harbor five schooners dragged their anchors and went ashore. At House Harbor the "Sophia" is ashore. The steamer "M. A. Starr" arrived at Canso yesterday from Halifax, and reports the whole coast strewn with wreckage. The captain took refuge from the gale in Kiscoombe. He says he counted over sixty sail at White Head during the gale, and most of them must have gone ashore. So far as known yet, no lives were lost; but it is feared that later reports will not be so favorable.

PARIS, Oct. 30.

An official return to the Bureau of Deputies shows that 3,065 Communists have been amnestied; 1,300 being prisoners, 1,700 condemned by default, and about 1,000 remain excluded.

LONDON, Oct. 30.

The Russian newspapers publish correspondence from Burma, giving details of a disastrous affair at Grok Tepe, and the subsequent retreat of the Russians. *Golos* says the announcement by the English papers of the suspension of the expedition against Tekko Turcomans has been confirmed.

John Baldwin Buckstone, comedian, died this morning, aged 77 years.

Robert Carden, magistrate, has refused to hear further evidence in justification of the alleged libel against Lawson of the "Telegraph," by Labonchere of *Truth*. The question to be decided by him is simply whether or not Labonchere's articles are libellous. Labonchere asks the Queen's Bench to compel Carden to hear further evidence.

King's County Exhibition.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

MR. EDITOR:—You may think that the following remarks were written a day after the fair; if so, you are right; nevertheless they are not yet too late to appear in your popular and widespread journal. The King's County Exhibition and Industrial Fair eclipsed everything that ever before appeared in Georgetown. The reception given to Governor Haviland and suite, would do honor even to a Prince of the Blood Royal! The dais or platform on which His Honor presided was handsomely carpeted, and all around it were raised colors, banners, and other becoming decorations, as tokens of respect and rejoicing. In fact, the Drill Shed had more the appearance of a grand banquetting hall or a ball room than that of a place where the industry, art and skill of our people were to be exhibited. The inhabitants of King's County have much reason for congratulating themselves on having such a building as the Drill Shed for the use and accommodation of the County on grand public occasions. Nor were the arrangements and preparations made for the convenience of our farmers and their wives and daughters wanting or deficient in any respect or particular. Everything was as near perfection as possible. And although thousands were assembled as rivals for prizes in every kind of handicraft and of works of art and beauty, not a countenance could be seen that did not beam with the light of friendship and the joyous radiance of good humor and good will. Never did a happier throng congregate. For once, at least, did King's County, and Georgetown its capital, do themselves high honor and justice. And there is a good guarantee that this is but one of many such happy events which will be enjoyed in the future. Nor can it be otherwise, for the town is certainly situated, and now enjoys an advantage and a convenience long prayed for and looked for, viz: a good, commodious and trustworthy steamer to carry on a traffic with the South and the West. It has also the advantage of a railway running into its very centre. Mention should also be made of the arrangements contrived for the horses on Exhibition. This was a circular area enclosed by ropes, inside of which the noble animals were marshalled like so many war chargers, and around which a thousand and one spectators walked in all the ecstasy of excitement and delight.

The managers of the Exhibition deserve the unfeigned thanks and gratitude of the whole County, for the superior manner in which they performed their arduous duties, and I am sure that the public will coincide with me when I state that the worthy Secretary did all in his power to make the Exhibition a success, and there can be no doubt that if they be spared until another Exhibition takes place, they will again be invited to accept the same position.
