

European News Notes.

A Greek soldier receives three cents a day.
Garibaldi is pale and thin. His beard and hair are white as snow. His eyes alone are bright.

The Czarwitsch has arrived at St. Petersburg from Livadia.

A despatch from Rome announces that the Tiber is subsiding.

A despatch to the "Standard" from Copenhagen reports that the health of the Queen has improved.

The serious illness of the Emperor of Germany is announced. Prince Bismarck is also said to be very ill.

The nihilists have distributed among working men at St. Petersburg a violently seditious address.

A despatch from Berlin to the News says the Bundersrath has passed a law prolonging the state of siege in Berlin another year.

The Queensland Parliament has been prorogued. The government's position is stronger and they have succeeded in passing the bill for the construction of a transcontinental railway and their other principal measure.

One hundred and thirty deputies have signed M. Renault's proposition for a grant of 50,000,000fr. for the construction of a tunnel through the Simplon Mountain. It is stated that Italy and Switzerland have promised subscriptions.

The Kurdish leader, Abdallah, has fled. The *Golos* says the Kurds are threatening Tabreez, and the Russian Consul there has been ordered to Tiflis. The Sultan has sent a telegram to the Shah of Persia congratulating him upon quelling the Kurdish revolt.

A despatch from the *Political Correspondence* from Athens says:—"Count von Radowitz, the German Envoy, has arrived here and interviewed Premier Coumoundourou. He advised the Premier not to jeopardize the interests of Greece by precipitate action. The Ambassadors of the other Powers joined in the advice of Count von Radowitz."

The Manchester *Guardian* says:—"The agitation for an advance of wages in Northeast Lancashire is renewed. At a meeting of representatives of the weavers at Blackburn on Saturday a resolution was passed affirming that an improvement has taken place in the cotton trade and expressing the hope that employers would now give the promised increase."

Laycock has written to the *Sportsman* saying he is quite willing to remain in London another six weeks to row Hulan for £200 a side and the championship. Ross, Trickett and Laycock practised yesterday, the two former for their match. Ross is rather unwell and complains of the loss of power in his limbs. Hosmer has challenged Nicholson or Elliott to a match on the Thames course for £100 a side, to be rowed within a month from the time of signing articles. Elliott to concede Hosmer five seconds start.
