Nurse Shortage May Be Relieved By New Training

TORONTO, Sept. 13 — (CP) — A new kind of nursing course, combining two years' study with one year of on-the-job training, has started at Toronto Western Hospital. Seventy-seven young women are attending classes.

The course is a major departure from the traditional three-year unpaid apprenticeship, which requires a combination of regular hospital service and studies throughout. The western students will receive all their academic instruction in the first two years and their third year will be devoted to full-time hospital work for which a salary will be paid.

The revised course, being tried out for the first time, is supported by the Atkinson Charitable Foundation through grants of \$20,000 annually for five years. The ultimate purpose is to make the nursing profession more attractive to Canadian girls, without sacrificing quality and scope of training.

Gladys Sharpe, western's director of nursing, has high hopes for the course.

"Only Solution"
"It's the only way to solve the nursing shortage," she said in an interview. "I'm hopeful that the fall of 1952 will see with an increased nursing staff of well-prepared young women."

Members of the initial class have varied racial backgrounds. Austra Evele came here from Latvia. Esther Saisko is a Vancouver-born Japanese-Canadian. Barbara Lane is a Chinese-Canadian from Toronto. Maire Mattila was born in Finland. Harlette Traxin is a Canadian of Ukrainian descent.

Others in the class are: Mary Robertson, Shelburne, N.S.; Patricia Hale, Edmonton; Eleanor Croxall, Orillia, Ont.; Verla Caselman, Englehart, Ont.; Carole Gomoll, Levack, Ont.; Millicent Hunter, Hutsville, Ont.; Doris O'Grady, Timmins, Ont.; Lois Carlisle and June Scott, Owen Sound, Ont.

Still others are from such Ontario centres as Port Colborne, Alliston, Milton, Waterloo, Guelph and Palmerston.

Gideon Secretary Reviews Progress

Mr. Arthur J. Burnham, General Secretary of the Gideons, left yesterday after a short visit to Charlottetown where he called upon members of the local camp. He is making a tour of the Atlantic Provinces following the very successful conference held in St. John, N. B.

In an interview yesterday, Mr. Burnham said that steady progress is being made in the work across Canada. A new camp in Fredericton, N. B. brings the number of active groups in this region to 68. He will visit Truro before proceeding to Newfoundland where he expects to organize a new camp in St. Johns.

Last year the Gideons distributed 124,000 copies of the Scriptures in hospitals, prisons, hotels, and schools, and this number is expected to be higher in the present year.

In Prince Edward Island the local camp expects to present a personal copy of the New Testament, Psalms, and Proverbs, to every child in grades 5, 6, and 7.

Rapid expansion has been experienced since the movement was introduced to Great Britain last year. Branches have been formed in the Scandinavian countries, Germany, Greece, South Africa. The Gideons have one representative in Japan working closely with General MacArthur in extending the Gideon Ministry throughout that country.
