Fruit, Vegetable Sales Boost Is Seen Possible In Britain

LONDON (CP)—A nine-man Canadian trade mission is headed for the European Common Market, countries covetous of there is plenty of scope for increased sales in Britain of Canada's fruit and vegetable products.

"However, it will be a real battle," said John E. Shaffer of Berwick, N.S., the group's spokesman and leader.

The government sponsored mission, representing growers and processors, spent the last 10 days in Britain studying the channels that could be used to expand Canadian exports in their field.

Shaffer said he was neither "pessimistic nor over-optimistic" about expanding sales in Britain, but he stressed that the island nation is the world's largest importer of food products.

It is also one of the most competitive markets in existence. And delegation members left with the conviction that a lot of thinking will have to be done to meet the intense competition on price alone.

As a part of a program to do this, some mission members are giving serious consideration to the development of a distinctive Canadian brand that would be marketed in Britain.

Instead of competing with each other, as they do in Canada, producers and processors would band together to achieve the economies of large-scale distribution in export markets. This new idea is being studied by a committee of industry and government representatives called the Fruit and Vegetable Products Export Project.

Britain in pre-war days was one of Canada's most important export outlets for tinned fruits and vegetables. Currency difficulties after the war forced Britain to maintain stringent import controls on goods from dollar area countries. Most of these were relaxed two years ago.

But Canadians still have to contend with some British import quotas on products such as self-pack apples.

The food and vegetable products trade mission is one of the 24 missions sponsored this year by the federal government. It is to visit West Germany, France, Belgium and the Netherlands before returning to Canada June 2.

Grant Is Made For Research

OTTAWA (CP)—A program to assist scientific research in the north with grants totaling up to \$100,000 each year has been announced by Northern Affairs Minister Dinsdale.

A seven-man committee has been appointed to receive requests for grants from university professors and other scientists and make recommendations to the minister.

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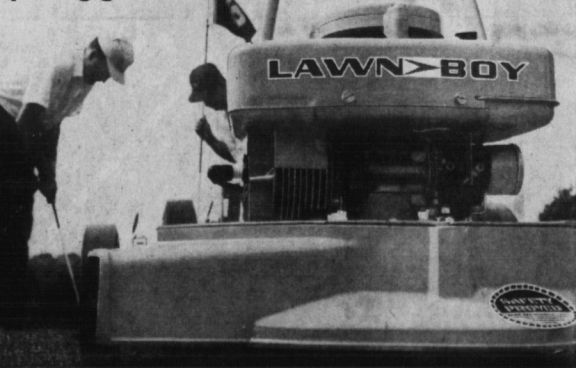
