BRITAIN'S IMPORTS. We have received a copy of "Provision Trade Statistics," with the compliments of the compiler, Mr. W. A. McKnight, 24 and 26 Matthew Street, Liverpool, Eng.

During the year the imports from Canada of cheese amounted to 1,337,198 cwt., at a value of £3,116,211. "All other countries" sent 1,052,011 cwt. valued at £2,500,880.

Of butter, Canada sent last year 250,083 cwt. at the value of £1,113,956. In 1895 she sent 38,949 cwt. at a value of £153,401.

The United States and Denmark supply most of the bacon consumed by Great Britain, while the United States alone supplies nearly all of the hams and lard.

LETTER FROM DR. JENKINS.

SIR,—In my last, while freely admitting the loyalty of the majority of the Liberal party, I questioned that of the leaders. There are some of their followers also who, misled by over-zealous partizanship, conceive that they are showing fealty to the party leaders by expressing sympathy for the Boers.

I stated then, (a matter of history) in refuting the false charge of lip loyalty made by the Patriot against the Liberal-Conservative party, that the Premier of Canada not only refused to send a contingent to South Africa on the ground that the constitution forbade it, but left the country in a serious crisis and went to a banquet in Chicago when he should be striving, if a difficulty lay in the way, to overcome it.

I also stated (another matter of history) that in his place in the House of Commons Mr. Laurier declared "he would shoulder his musket" to shoot down our brave boys who went out to fight for their Queen and country.

Now, I do not say that this man is disloyal, but I ask every intelligent reader to say if such are the acts and such the words of a true and loyal British subject. The only defence made by the Patriot was a feeble attempt at a French-English letter, equally devoid of point or humor but bearing the mark of an individual occupying a prominent place in the local government to whom I shall pay attention shortly.

his conviction I may say, cost him nothing. Unlike Tarte, he had no \$8,000 a year and pickings (don't forget the pickings) to lose and with the air of a Bombastes Furioso he, figuratively, dashes his seat in the face of the speaker, struts off brave, independent and victorious,—a man who dared to be disloyal and stand by it.

It appears to me to be a matter not for rejoicing but for the deepest reprobation that a constituency could be found in this fair Canada of ours to elect as their representative a man destitute of patriotism and unmoved by the dangers which beset our common country.

Canada, justly proud of her loyalty, would be standing sullen and immovable, while all the sister colonies had sprung to arms in defence of our great Mother, our people, sunk in humiliation helplessly bewailing the opportunity lost of showing their devotion to the Empire, and of proving they were the greatest branch of that great British oak that overshadows the world.

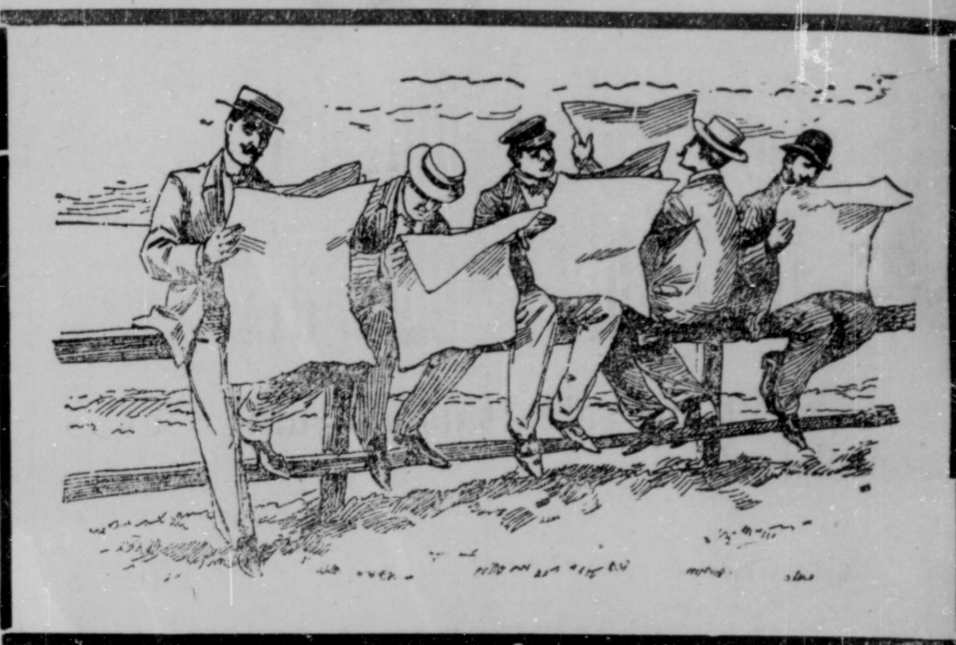

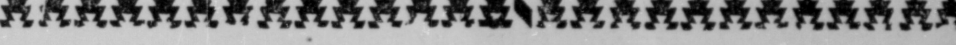
