Arrive By Train And Depart By Naval Ship

11.40 a.m.—Leave C.N.R. Station for Provincial Building via Weymouth Street, Euston Street, Great George Street, Grafton Street, Prince Street, Richmond Street.

11.50 a.m.—Arrive Provincial Building.—Met by Premier and Mrs. Jones.—Inspect Army Guard of Honour.—Enter Confederation Chamber.—Presentation of Members of Legislature and their wives.—Signing of Register.—Appearance on balcony.—Address of welcome and presentation by Premier.—Reply by Her Highness.

12.20 p.m.—Leave Provincial Building via Richmond Street and Queen Street.

12.40 p.m.—Leave City Hall via Queen Street, Water Street, Rockford Street, Brighton Road, Ambrose Street, McGill Avenue, North River Road, Park Roadway.

1.00 p.m.—Arrive at Government House.

1.15 p.m.—Luncheon (private) with Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. Frowse.

3.00 p.m.—Leave Government House via Park Roadway, Brighton Road, Euston Street, Queen Street, Grafton Street, Weymouth Street, Longworth Avenue, Mount Edward Road.

3.25 p.m.—Arrive Dominion Experimental Station for tour of Station (among other things will see foxes and mink).—Presentation of approximately twelve Scout and Guide awards.—Planting an Oak.

4.15 p.m.—Tea at Experimental Station.

4.45 p.m.—Leave Experimental Station via Mount Edward Road, Longworth Avenue, Weymouth Street, Fitzroy Street.

4.55 p.m.—Arrive Charlottetown Forum for period of hockey.

5.15 p.m.—Leave the Forum via Fitzroy Street, Weymouth Street.

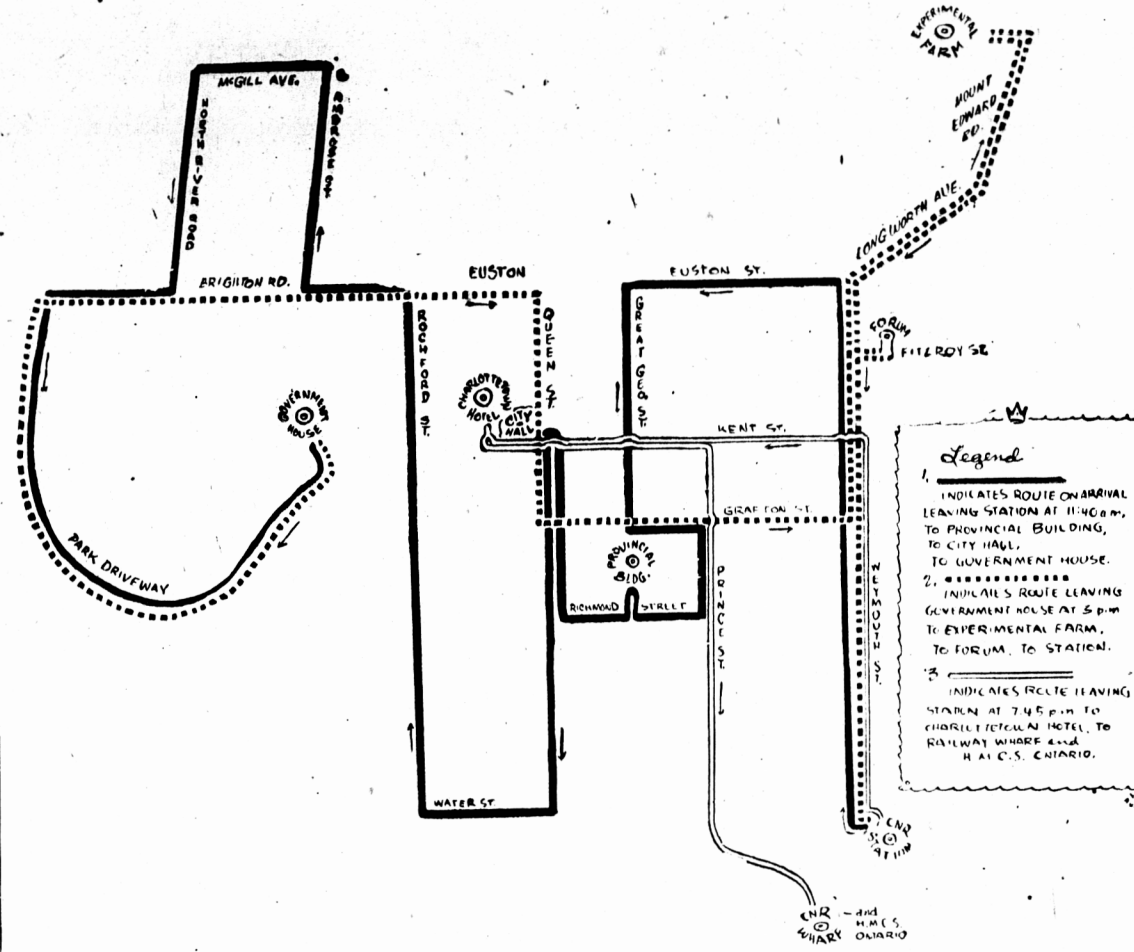
10.00 p.m.—Leave Charlottetown Hotel via Kent and Prince Streets for Railway Wharf.

This event will take place prior to the visit to the Experimental Station and will delay arrival at the Station, Forum and Railway Station by approximately thirty minutes.)

Route Of Royal Visit In Charlottetown



The route of the Royal tour in Charlottetown on Nov. 9th, traveling over the same street more than once, as it does in several instances, has been divided here into three stages to simplify map making.

The first, the arrival of the Royal Couple at the C.N.R. Station until the time they reach Government House, appears as a solid black line. The second covers the time on leaving Government House until the return to the station and appears as a dotted line. The drive from the station to the Charlottetown Hotel and finally to the C. N. R. wharf is indicated by a thin double line.

Old Friend Is First To Greet Royal Visitors

Viscount Alexander, the first person to greet Princess Elizabeth and Prince Philip when they arrived at Quebec, is an old friend of the heiress presumptive to the Throne.

The famous British battle tactician also greeted the Royal couple on their arrival at Ottawa and was their host during their two-day stay in the Canadian Capital.

It is only seven years ago—in 1944—when the then General Alexander was responsible for the King's safety on a flying visit to the Italian battlefields.

continued: "It was an anxious time for everyone while the King was away. Lilibet used to say, comforting herself, 'But General Alexander has promised faithfully to take care of him!'"

General, later Field-Marshal Alexander, evidently carried out his role of royal protector for no one ever heard of any harm coming to the King on his Italian visit.

Table Of Precedence In Presentation To Royalty

Canada's official table of precedence, which bears the King's approval, is used in all federal functions for Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh during their tour of the Dominion. The table, which originated in the early days of the British monarchy, determines the order of presentation of officials and other high-ranking persons at Royal and state functions. It was put into law in Britain about the sixteenth century.

In Canada, the table places the Governor-General first—in the United Kingdom the sovereign has the highest rank—followed by the Prime Minister, the Federal Cabinet and the Lieutenant-Governors of the 10 Provinces. Members of the church, the judiciary, the military and the state follow in an established order.

Curiously, though Ottawa is a national capital, the Canadian table gives no place to diplomatic representatives. However, by courtesy, they are placed behind the Lieutenant-Governors.

Provincial Rules

The Provinces have their own tables of precedence. They are based on the federal table, but vary according to provincial custom. They will be used when the Princess and the Duke attend provincial functions. Generally, the provincial tables place the Lieutenant-Governor first, followed by the Premier and members of the Provincial Cabinet. From there on, the order closely follows that set out in the federal table.

There is no table of precedence for municipal ceremonies. However, officials say that even the smallest hamlet can adapt the official table to local use. For example, the mayor or reeve would come first as the highest municipal official. The members of his council, in a sense his cabinet, would be next, followed by consultants-general or other foreign representatives, local church dignitaries, military officials and so on.

Previous Royal Visits

British Royalty has visited Canada on several previous occasions during the past 159 years, averaging one visit every 20 years. History records the following earlier Royal visits to this country:

1792 — Prince Edward, fourth son of King George III, later Duke of Kent and father of Queen Victoria.

1860 — Prince Albert Edward, Prince of Wales, later King Edward VII.

1861 — Prince Alfred Ernest, 17-year-old younger brother of the late King Edward VII, visited Canada informally while a midshipman in the Royal Navy.

1870 — Prince Arthur, third son of Queen Victoria, later Duke of Connaught who was appointed Governor-General of Canada in 1911.

1884 — Prince George, later George V, a midshipman on H.M.C.S. Canada.

1901 — Duke and Duchess of Cornwall, later King George V and Queen Mary.

1919 — Prince Edward, Prince of Wales, later King Edward VIII, now Duke of Windsor.

1927 — Prince Edward, Prince of

Wales and his brother, the Duke of Kent.

1939 — Their Majesties King George VI and Queen Elizabeth.

In addition to these Royal visits he was the stay in Canada of Princess Louise, daughter of Queen Victoria and popular chateleine at Rideau Hall during the regime of her husband, the Marquis of Lorne, as Governor-General of Canada from 1878 to 1883.

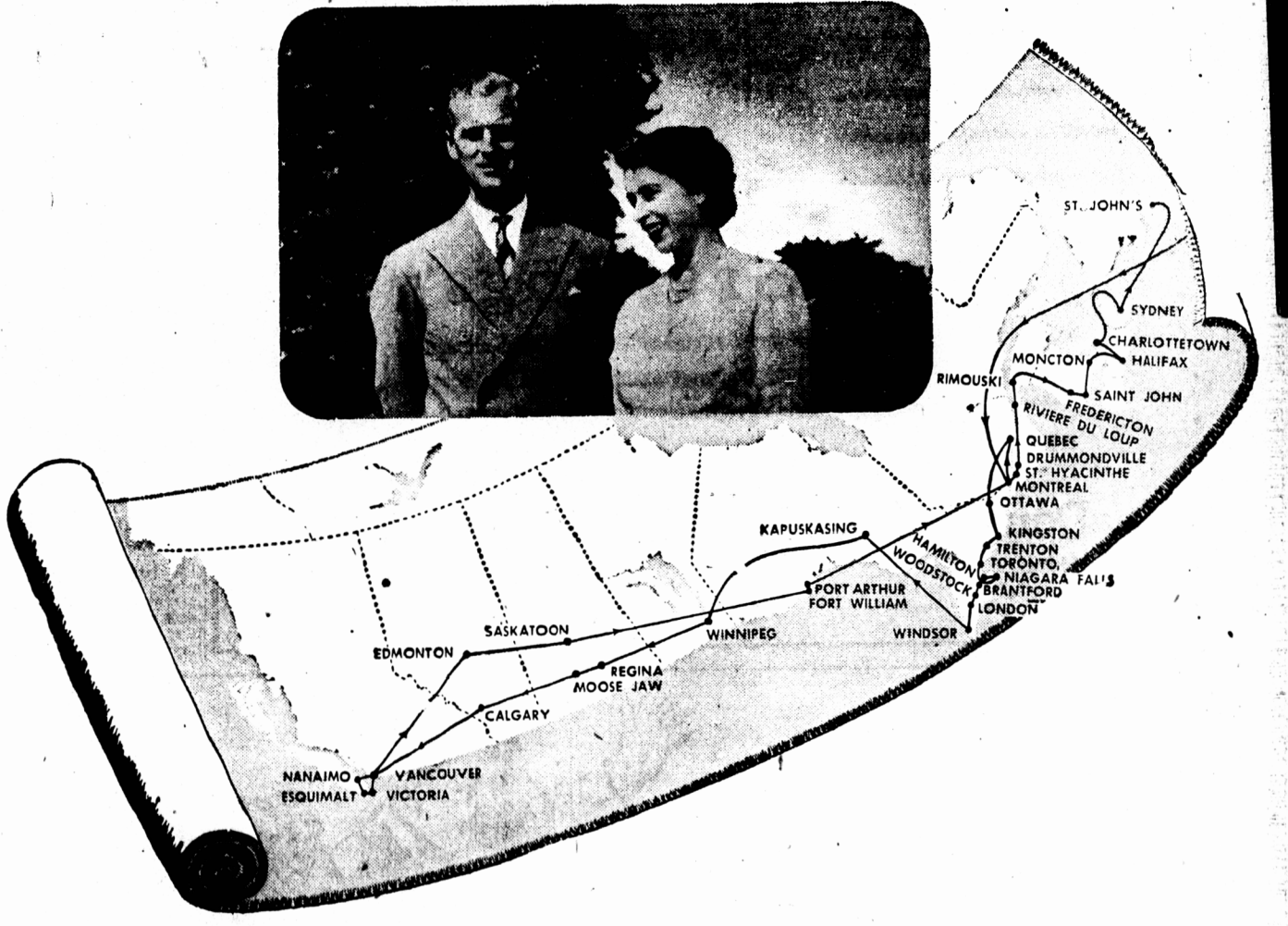
