Gen. Herbert and Aldershot Camp.

OTTAWA, Sept. 26. General Herbert returned to Ottawa to-day, after an official visit to the Maritime Provinces. Speaking of the inspection of the camp at Aldershot, he stated that the work done there was the hardest and best he had seen in any camp in Canada.

The Brazilian Rebellion.

BUNOS AYRES, Sept. 26. There was desultory fighting all yesterday around Santos. The rebels are gaining accessions to their forces, and despatches to the rebels are of frequent occurrence. The capture of a whole regiment has gone over to the insurgents.

The Northwest Wheat Crop.

OTTAWA, Sept. 26. Director Samuels, of the Central Experimental Farm, returned from the far West to-day. He estimates the average wheat crop of Manitoba and the Territories at fifteen or sixteen bushels per acre.

Brazilian Despatch to Paris.

PARIS, Sept. 26. The Brazilian envoy to France received this despatch to-day from Rio Janeiro: "The city resumed its wonted aspect last evening. The rebels never succeeded in capturing any point on the coast. They captured neither Niteroy nor Santos."

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

BUNOS AYRES, Sept. 22.-A portion of the rebel Brazilian fleet continues to blockade an important part of Santos and according to advices received here, have made the blockade more effective. The rebels have also captured Fort Desterro on Santa Catharina Island.

LONDON, Sept. 23.-A Rio Janeiro despatch says negotiations for peace are progressing well between the government and Admiral Mello, commander of the insurgents. If these negotiations fail of a successful issue, it is feared the rebel fleet will lay the city in ashes.

NEW YORK, Sept. 23.-The Hayden warship Alexander Farrington off Tharou on the extreme south-west coast of Haiti on Wednesday, Sept. 6th, all on board the number of 80, with the exception of one sailor who was missing, and those who lost their lives were Gen. Melini, Haitian special envoy to San Domingo, Mr. Cohen Haitian ex-minister to Mexico, Mr. Pejan, Haitian consul-general to San Domingo. News of the catastrophe was brought to New York by steamer Prins William.

LONDON, Sept. 23.-A despatch to the Economist from Paris, says the negotiations started by the United States to raise a loan of fifty millions in gold, at 21 per cent, have collapsed, partly through the intervention of the French Government, which wanted a reduction made in the McKimley Tariff on French imports into the United States in return for permitting the official listing of the proposed bonds at the Paris Bourse. The United States Government refused.

OTTAWA, Sept. 24.-An order-in-council prohibiting the importation of dried fruit, except from Smyrna is causing many inquiries addressed to the department of agriculture by importers. Many people are anxious to know whether figs, raisins, and other dried fruits from various points in southern Europe will be allowed to enter the Dominion in view of the alleged existence of cholera in that district. The uniform answer of the department has been that no dried fruit from any infected district is received in Canada, although it is the order-in-council mentions the district of Smyrna. It is held that the germs of cholera which are conveyed in boxes in the way of epidemic. It is understood that the boxes are commonly received by any ordinary processes. The order in council will not be continued, of course, after the epidemic disappears, the goods affected being only those packed during the period of epidemic. It is understood that the boxes will rest upon importers of proving that this class of goods imported via England has not been packed during the period of cholera epidemic. The government does not desire to hamper commercial relations, but precautions such as that now being enforced are demanded "in the interest of the health of the community."
