City Rotary Club Hosts Gold Cup And Saucer Girls

It was Gold Cup and Saucer Day at Rotary Club yesterday as by tradition the eight lovely girls were introduced to the public for the first time in 1966 at the club luncheon at the Charlottetown.

There were some men at the head table, but few noticed them despite the fact more attention was focused on the table than is generally accorded at club meetings. The lovely Gold Cup and Saucer Girls with their "den mother," Marilyn Kane who is young and charming enough to still be one of them, commanded all the interest of the large gathering.

GIRLS INTRODUCED
They were introduced by chairman Bill Hancock and re-

ceived a solid round of applause. On behalf of Rotary each of the girls was presented with a beautiful gift by president Claude Hunter who, in speaking of the big race Friday which decides which of the girls becomes Miss Gold Cup and Saucer, said: "None of you deserves to lose so I can only hope the race ends in an eight-way tie."

A fresh look at Parliament was taken by the freshman Prince County M.P., David MacDonald, when as guest speaker he made a strong plea to English-speaking Canada for a better understanding of the problems and aims of the French-speaking part of the country. "In order to survive the French have always had to accept the Eng-

lish, but the English here seem to think there is something wrong with learning to speak French."

"All over Europe it is a mark of distinction to be able to operate successfully in several languages. Why should we be ashamed to speak French?" He thought it was because of this attitude by the English that "we are drifting dangerously close to a great split."

LARGES PUBLIC
He urged the public not to judge Parliament and its Members by the sometimes few members sitting in the House during a session. "Most of the real work of Parliament is done by Members in committees and by consultations, and there really is too much work and too little time."

Mr. MacDonald noted there was a multiplicity of political parties and said this created serious difficulty in Parliament and said it was incredible "the amount of time it takes to get anything accomplished."

The speaker was introduced by the chairman and thanked by co-chairman Jack Davis who humorously remarked 100 years ago a MacDonald came to this island and accomplished great things, now the island is sending another MacDonald to Ottawa and is expecting great things from him.

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City Residents Are Arraigned

Island Man Is Arrested

Raymond W. Ahern of Alberton faces preliminary hearing in a Halifax police court on August 30 on a charge of being in possession of a sawed-off shotgun when he was arrested at Kearney Lake, N.S. on August 5.

Ahern, who is said to have had police arresting him that he was on a holiday with the shotgun, pleaded not guilty to the firearms charge and elected trial by judge and jury.
