

Household Hints.

COOKIES.—One cup sour cream, one and a half cups sugar, one teaspoonful soda, nutmeg, and flour to roll out stiff; if sweet cream is used add two teaspoonfuls cream of tartar.

TOMATO PRESERVES (either ripe or green).—Take fourteen pounds of tomatoes and cut into halves; make a syrup of seven pounds of sugar; put the tomatoes into the syrup and add six lemons sliced (let the rind remain on them), half a pound of green ginger cut fine; let it boil slowly until the fruit is well cooked; skim out the fruit, and let the syrup boil thick, and then pour it over the fruit.

SODA FOR BURNS.—A speedy cure for burns from fire crackers or from any cause:—Wet a cloth and sprinkle upon it a liberal allowance of bi-carbonate of soda (common cooking soda), bind it around the wound. This will speedily relieve the smart and burn. It is a harmless and thoroughly efficient remedy. If no cloth can be had promptly wet the part and sprinkle some of the dry soda upon it.

BEEF SOUP.—Three pounds good juicy beef, cut into about twenty pieces; two carrots, one turnip, six large onions, teaspoonful salt, one-half teaspoonful pepper, two good heads celery; cut the vegetables small; put all into a large pot, with four quarts water; let it boil very gently, or rather let it simmer eight hours; let it stand all night; take off the pot next morning; make it boiling hot when wanted for dinner; this is excellent properly made.

SOAP.—Twenty pounds of pure grease to fourteen pounds of potash will make a clean fish barrel full; the potash procure at the wholesale drug stores; dissolve it in water in a brass kettle over the fire; put the grease in the barrel; first pour the solution of potash over the grease, and stir it with a stick; let it stand twenty-four hours, then pour a pail of cold water in the barrel, and stir it thoroughly; let it stand twelve hours, and as it thickens add a pail of cold water and stir again, and add water every twelve hours and stir until the barrel is full. In cold weather use warm water. Be particular to have the barrel tight, as lye will leak through where water will not. A barrel will not answer more than twice, as the lye destroys it.

FOR LOW SPIRITS.—Take one ounce of the seeds of resolution, mixed well with the oil of conscience, infuse it into a large spoonful of the salt of patience; distil very carefully a composing plant called 'others' woes,' which you will find in every part of the garden of life growing under the broad leaves of disguise; add a small quantity and it will greatly assist the salts of patience in their operation. Gather a handful of the blossoms of hope, then sweeten them properly with the balm of prudence; and if you can get any of the seeds of true friendship, you will have the most valuable medicine that can be administered. Be careful to get the seeds of true friendship, as there is a seed very much like it called 'self-interest,' which will spoil the whole composition. Make the ingredients into pills and take one night and morning, and the cure will be effected.

A Hamilton project is to organize an iron smelting company, with headquarters at or near Kingston, and a capital of \$200,000, in consequence of the recent advance in the price of iron.

A Dublin, Ireland, cable says: Signs of improvement in the condition of the country are becoming more apparent daily, and favorable accounts of the harvest are being received from all parts.

A SEAT FOR HON. E. BLAKE.—A Bowmanville, Ont., despatch states that H. W. Burke, M. P. for West Durham, has resigned his seat in the Dominion Parliament to make room for Hon. E. Blake.

The Nova Scotia Government has appointed as additional governors of the Dalhousie College, the Rev. John Forrest, of Halifax; Rev. John McMillan, of Truro; John S. Maclean, Peter Jack and John Donll, of Halifax.

We find the following in our Western exchanges, received last evening:—H. C. Corbin, of Waterford, Ohio, has been arrested for blowing up a hotel a few weeks ago. At the time it was charged upon the temperance people.

In the districts of Malaga and Alicante alone, 2,000 houses have been destroyed. It is believed that the floods have caused the loss of 1,000 people; 570 bodies have already been found.
