## These Notes May Be Useful In Meeting Her Majesty

Here are some notes for guidance in connection with the Royal Tour this summer.

Children's functions are likely to play an important part and in this connection it is stated that "the first thing to ensure is that every child present should get a good close-up view of the Queen and The Duke of Edinburgh".

In respect to clothes and uniform, it is advised that the Queen does not wear uniform. In regard to ladies' clothes, the Queen does not wish anyone to be put to unnecessary expense by buying special clothes or gloves. The following points may be of interest.

### DAYTIME

Long dresses need not be worn at Garden Parties or other daytime functions, unless ladies are specifically asked to wear them. Short afternoon dresses are correct.

Hats should always be worn at daytime functions. Short gloves should always be worn at daytime functions, they

need not be white and should not be taken off before the wearer is presented to the Queen or the Duke of Edinburgh.

If ladies are in possession of long gloves, they should be worn at formal evening functions.

It is never possible to forecast what coloured clothes the Queen will wear at any particular function.

### FAVOURITE COLOURS

People often want to know the Queen's favourite colour. It is not possible to answer this as Her Majesty has no marked preferences. The Queen, however, does not like magenta.

### FAVOURITE FLOWERS

The Queen prefers whatever flowers are in season in each place she visits.

Her Majesty is always glad to accept a bouquet when one is offered as part of a function. Bouquets should be presented by children rather than grown-ups and only one should be offered at each function.

Plan Kitchen Layout To Conserve Energy

"Good health is certainly a substantial foundation on which to build happiness," I observed. "And an energy-saving kitchen can help homemakers maintain good health. Yet many women are struggling along with inconvenient kitchens, blaming their fatigue on the amount of work they do rather than facing the fact that their kitchens are so inadequate they cause an unnecessary drain of energy."

"In many cases, Madame," the chef said, "the houses in which they live are rented, so the ladies do not even consider how they might make the kitchens more convenient."

"This is a mistake. Kitchens must always be made as energy-saving as possible. Then there will be strength left over for other things besides preparing meals."

"It is indeed laudable that special energy-saving kitchens are being designed for cardiac cases," I went on, "but why not make kitchens convenient in the first place and possibly avoid the extreme fatigue that may cause a heart attack? Let's call in the test-kitchen staff, Chef, for a brainstorming session on how to make a rented kitchen convenient."

**SOME SUGGESTIONS**  
Here are some of the suggestions that were made:  
Keep off your feet, work sitting as much as possible. Get a comfortable chair of the right height for easy work at a table; a stool of the right height to use at a counter.  
Hang all utensils in convenient places within easy reach.  
Assemble seasons near the range, other ingredients at place of use.  
If kitchen cupboards are too high, lower them or get a sturdy

**TOMORROW'S DINNER**  
Spiced tomato cocktail, oven-fried chicken, whipped potato, spinach or kale, cranberry-orange pudding, cranberry-orange sauce, coffee, tea or milk.  
Measurements are level; recipes for 4 to 6.  
Cranberry-orange pudding: Make up 1 pkg. oatmeal bread according to directions on pkg.  
Next make cranberry-orange sauce (see below); pour into a buttered 8" square pan. Spoon the oatmeal batter over the sauce. Brush with melted butter or margarine. Dust with 3 tsp. cinnamon-sugar. Bake 25 min. in a hot oven, 400 degrees F. Cut in squares. Serve warm.

**CRANBERRY-ORANGE SAUCE:** Combine and beat together 1/4 (1-lb.) can cranberry sauce, 1/2 c. sugar and 2 c. diced peeled orange. Blend 2 tsp. corn-starch, 2 tsp. water, 1/4 tsp. salt and 1 tsp. grated orange rind. Stir into fruit. Stir-boil 3 min. Then add 1 tsp. butter or margarine, according to taste.

**TRICK OF THE CHEF**  
When preparing oven-fried chicken, brush the sections when nearly done with oil and finely-chopped roasted peanuts, then finish the oven-frying.
