AFTER DAMAGES.—A writ was today served on Mayor Dawson in the matter of the claim of James T. Parrie against the city for injuries sustained by him some time ago.

WELL CALL HERE.—The steamer City of Glen left Halifax on Monday evening and will arrive here early on Thursday morning, calling at Sheet Harbor and Isaac's Harbor.

THE ROSSIN CASE.—After hearing the evidence of fourteen witnesses, the case against Frank Rossin was yesterday afternoon adjourned until Saturday next, when further testimony will be taken.

IN PORT.—The Schr. General Middleton is in port with three hundred thousand cedar shingles. She is discharging at Connolly's wharf for Messrs Barrett & Chapin.

FROM MONTREAL.—The steamer Thames arrived last evening with a large cargo. She will leave to-morrow for North and South Sydney and St. John's with a good cargo made up largely of produce and sheep.

MEN DAMON DOWN.—The storm of Saturday night was very severe at the western end of the Province. The wind described a circle and blew with great violence. Trees were uprooted, hay stacks blown down and the roofs of several dwellings and barns were carried away.

THE NORTHERNBERLAND DETAINED.—By telegram we learn that the steamer Northernberland could not leave Summerside this morning. There was a large lying across the end of the wharf, and with the gale that was blowing she could not be moved. The steamer was therefore unable to get out.

DON'T FAIL TO ATTEND.—The Rev. G. M. Campbell will deliver a lecture in the Upper Methodist Church, on Tuesday evening next, November 13th, at 8 o'clock. His subject will be "The White City, or a Trip to the World's Fair." Admission—Ladies, 10 cents; gentlemen, 15 cents. Proceeds for church purposes. As this will be the last time Rev. Mr. Campbell will deliver this lecture in Charlottetown, everyone should make a point of attending. A rare treat it is in store for those who will be present on Tuesday night.

THE STORM TO-DAY.—A lively wind and rain storm, with slight snow flurries, began early this morning and continued throughout the forenoon. This afternoon the wind was not so high and there was but an occasional shower of rain. The telephone wires in the city were somewhat "crossed" as a result of the storm, and workmen had to be sent out to repair the line west of Hunter River. The King's County line seems to be all right. The St. Lawrence left for Pictou this morning, but had to put back on account of the storm after getting as far as Point Prim.

COMING HOME FOR THE WINTER.—The Boston correspondent of the St. John Star writes: "The travel of working people seems to be mostly one way this fall. Many people from the Maritime Provinces who have been here all summer are going home to remain for the winter, and the steamers from the Provinces report travel this way greatly on the decrease. The Plant steamer Florida arrived from Charlottetown on her last trip with only twenty-five passengers, who were coming here to work. Considering that the vessel calls at Cape Breton, this is a remarkably small list."

SIMPLE EXPLANATION OF GRIP.—Medical writers make it clear why grip is so fatal. They tell of hemorrhagic and pyemic or septic-pyemic form, with purulent and gangrenous inflammation of the lung tissue and frequent metastasis to other organs. One case of hemorrhages and hematomas in the muscular tissue paralyzing the heart, with profuse, profuse, profuse bleedings by diapedesis, pancytopenia, meningitis hemorrhagica interna, is mentioned. To many cases there is hyperemia of the pia, also meningeal infiltration and suppurative meningitis and hemorrhage into the lateral ventricle and very frequently lobar pneumonia.—St. Louis Post-Dispatch.

SUPREME COURT—MICHAELMAS TERM

TUESDAY, Nov. 6

Court opened today at 11 o'clock, the Chief Justice, Mr. Justice Hodgson and Mr. Justice Fitzgerald on the bench. On application of Mr. W. S. Stewart, Q. C., the application of John Hughes for certiorari to remove a conviction made by the Stipendiary Magistrate under the Canada Temperance Act, was set down for hearing on Tuesday next, 13th inst.

On motion of Mr. Stewart the hearing of the application of Richard Thorne for certiorari was set down for same day.

David C. Campbell vs. Hiram Woodside, an absent debtor. Tried in Summerside in October term last. Today Mr. Justice Fitzgerald gave judgment for the plaintiff for \$40.85.

In application of James R. Stetson for certiorari to remove a conviction made by Curtis Lord, J. P., under the Public Roads Act. On motion of Mr. McQuarrie, and on consent of the Attorney-General, Court orders the conviction to be quashed with costs, fixed at \$5.

Samuel Garrighan vs. Joseph Mulligan—An action of ejectment, heard at Summerside in October term last, when judgment was given for plaintiff. Mr. Davies today moved for and was granted a rule nisi for non-suit or a new trial, or for judgment for defendant, returnable Hilary Term next.

Alexander Horton, appellant, vs. William A. Chandler, respondent, action for assault. An appeal from the judgment of H. V. Palmer, Esq., J. P. On motion of H. J. Palmer the court dismissed the appeal with costs, and confirmed the conviction of the court below.

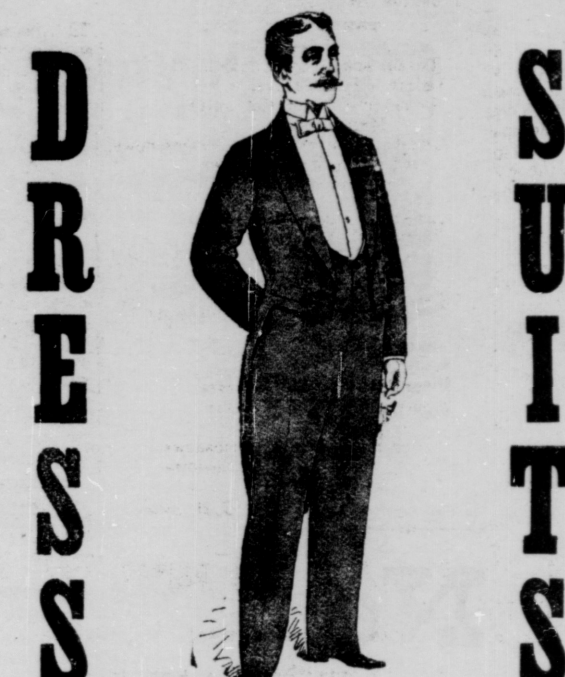
