

Mr. Gladstone's Austrian Note.

A correspondent of the London Times who signs himself "Veritas," and who seems to speak with the weight of an official utterance, writes to that journal to relate the manner in which the explanation between Count Karolyi and Mr. Gladstone was brought about, none of the current accounts being correct. He states that two or three days before Mr. Gladstone became Premier, Count Karolyi, referring to his recent remarks on Austria, was complaining of the embarrassing situation in which he should be placed on his first meeting with Mr. Gladstone. On April 23, the day on which Mr. Gladstone became Premier, the gentleman to whom this complaint was addressed repeated it on his own responsibility to Mr. Gladstone, who expressed his deep regret that the remarks in question should have given pain, and authorized the communication of that regret to his Excellency, accompanied by an assurance that words hastily uttered under a mistaken impression must not be regarded as indicative of his future policy, nor even of his general feelings towards Austria, which were those of sympathy and respect. The day following, April 24th, Count Karolyi acknowledged this communication by a letter to the same gentleman in which, accepting the affairs as an electoral incident which might be regarded as *non attentum*, he declares his readiness to take the first opportunity of cordially congratulating Mr. Gladstone on his accession to office. The explanation was then regarded as satisfactory and complete on both sides and "Veritas" affirms that it was not the result of any preemptory demand or threat of resignation on the part of the Ambassador, whose tone was considerate and conciliatory throughout. Nor did he ever attach to what he rightly considered an unofficial utterance the exaggerated importance with which it has been invested by the assailants of the Government. The affair, after being allowed to rest for some days, was reopened from the necessity, real or supposed, of making the explanation public in an official or diplomatic form.

A Prophecy not Appreciated.

There was witnessed in London a few weeks ago, a curious repetition of the act of fanaticism reported by Pepsy and Defoe. There was a big fire in Aldergate street in the city. While it was raging a young man, wildly attired and of wild appearance, rushed through the crowd bearing a banner with the startling inscription: "Come out of Babylon. The great city shall be utterly destroyed by fire." Solomon Eagle bore through the streets 200 years ago with his "Woe, woe, to the wicked city." Solomon make a good panie of his performances, but the circumstances of the moment favored him. On this occasion, with seventeen fire engines playing on the fire, people were not particularly afraid that 1667 would be repeated, and so they blocked the banner bearer's hat, made ribbons of his ensign, and pitched him in the puddle made by the flowing water cocks. In the end the police had to protect the prophet.

THE SISTERS OF CHARITY.—We understand that Sisters Aloysia and De-Sales, who left here in September last for Rome on important business in connection with their order, are now on their way home. The reason why these ladies undertook so lengthy a journey was to personally appeal to His Holiness the Pope in certain matters in dispute between the Superior of this order and the ecclesiastical authorities in this city. The mission, we are informed, has been eminently successful, and not only have these differences been arranged to the entire satisfaction of the Sisters, but the position of the Community has been definitely settled. The Mother Superior will henceforth be styled the Superior General of the Order, a title recently claimed by the ecclesiastical head of this diocese. The Pope himself is now the actual head of the order, but such duties as are required to be performed here will be attended to by a bishop, who is yet to be appointed. During all their stay in Rome the Sisters received from the ecclesiastical authorities the greatest kindness and attention, and just before leaving were favored by the Pope with a special audience.—*Hx. Chronicle.*

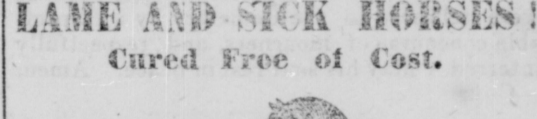

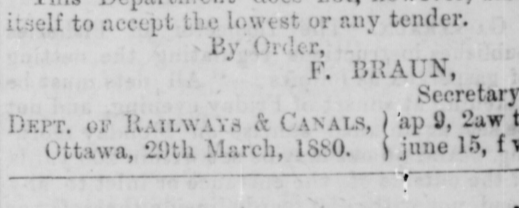

Notice to Bridge Builders.

SEALED TENDERS, addressed to the undersigned (Secretary of Railways and Canals), and endorsed "Tender for Bridges, Welland Canal," will be received at this office until the arrival of the Western Mails on TUESDAY, the 15th DAY OF JUNE NEXT, for the construction of swing and stationary Bridges at various places on the line of the Welland Canal. Those for high-ways are to be a combination of iron and wood, and those for railway purposes are to be of iron.

For the due fulfilment of the contract the party or parties whose tender is accepted will be notified that their tender is accepted, subject to a deposit of five per cent. of the bulk sum of the contract—of which the sum sent in with the tender will be considered a part—to be deposited to the credit of the Receiver General within eight days after the date of the notice.
Ninety per cent. only of the progress estimates will be paid until the completion of the work.
