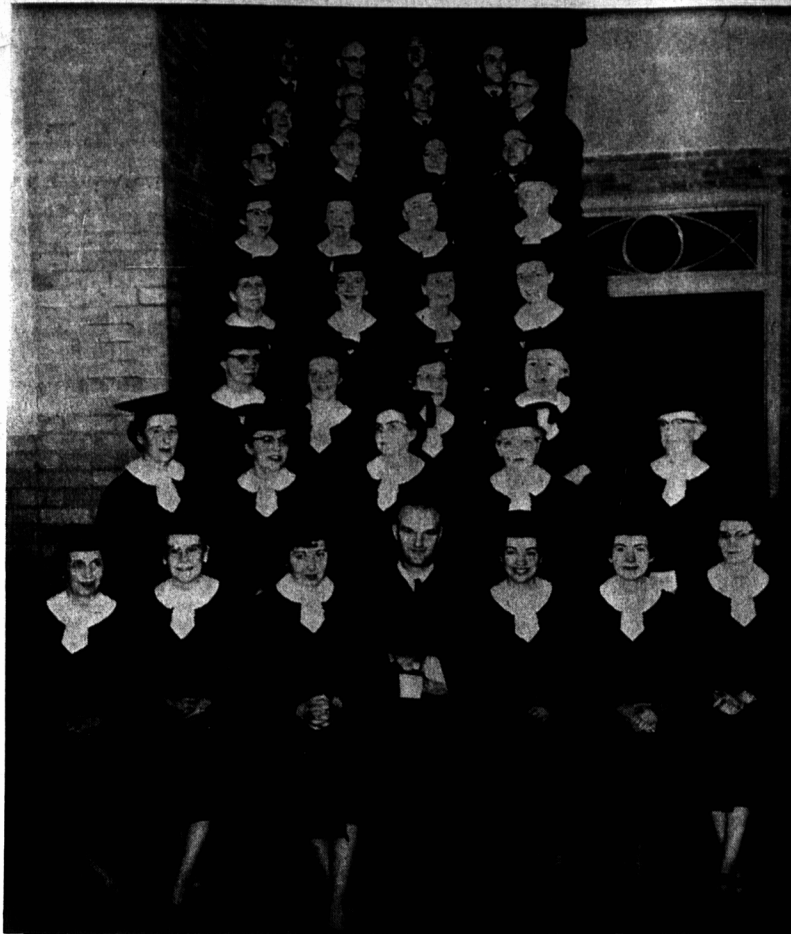

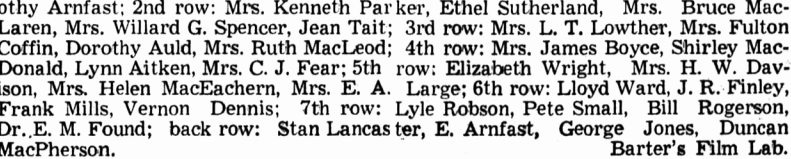
CARLOADINGS HIGHER

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Official Opening Today Of Spacious Civic Centre

This afternoon at 4 p.m. will mark the opening of the new Civic Centre which will house the Prince Edward Island Tourist Bureau and the Bus Terminal for the Island Motor Transport. The interior of the old Market Building has taken on a new look and citizens will find it difficult to realize that they are standing on the spot that only a few months ago was occupied by meat and vegetable vendors. The quarters of the Tourist Bureau which will occupy the northwest corner, will have an entrance from Queen Street. The Bus Terminal entrance will be from the Market Square on the south side of the building. Both offices can be reached from the spacious lobby and rest rooms in the interior of the building. The renovation of the Market Building to accommodate these two offices has been tastefully carried out in a natural grain plywood effect. Pastel shades predominate in the ceilings and upper walls. Floors are covered with tile and inlaid linoleum. The whole interior presents an air of brightness and cleanliness which is not only an asset to the offices concerned but a credit to the city as a whole.

Control Of Storage Rot In Potatoes

Potato tuber decay caused by the fungus parasites Fusarium sambucinum f. 6 and Fusarium coeruleum occurs to a greater or lesser extent in the potato stores of Canada and the Northern United States, the Science Service Laboratory at Charlottetown notes. These destructive fungi are present in the soil and enter the tubers through wounds contracted during harvesting and grading of the crop. Tubers infected in the fall may be completely decayed at time of seed cutting in late spring, and handling of the tubers at this time distributes many dry rot spores which later come to rest on the seed tuber surfaces. Experiments conducted at the Plant Pathology Laboratory, Charlottetown, during 1951, 1952, and 1954 have shown that such spores present on the seed piece surfaces may have an important bearing on the extent of decay occurring in the harvested crop. Results obtained in 1952 and 1954 showed that tuber decay was significantly greater in experimentally bruised tubers produced from seed artificially contaminated with storage rot spores than in similarly bruised tubers from seed dipped in Semesan bel without preceding spore treatment. In an experiment conducted in 1955 seed stock of the variety Keswick when treated with "Semesan bel" before seed piece cutting produced a crop which when bruised contracted 6.8 per cent rot. Comparable seed of this variety not treated with either a spore or chemical produced a crop which upon bruising developed 26.5 per cent rot after conditions of similar storage. The accumulated results show that Fusarium spores carried on the seed-piece surfaces may result in heavy contamination of the soil in which the tubers are formed. It is therefore recommended that potato varieties highly susceptible to storage rot should be seed-treated, thus eliminating this potential source of tuber rot from the seed-tuber surfaces.
