From time to time others would seem to have edged him out. But she spent the week at Drumlanrig Castle in Dumfriesshire, home of his parents, the Duke and Duchess of Buccleuch. She flew from there to Balmoral.

Lord Dalkeith and Princess Margaret have been friends since childhood. For three years he has been one of her more frequent escorts at dancing, dining and the theatre.

In June, a strong rumor swept London that the Princess and Lord Dalkeith would announce their engagement as soon as she was 20. "Nonsense," he told reporters. "The number of times I have reported that the Princess is irrelevant."

Earlier in the year, the same gossips were sure that Princess Margaret had been captivated by Peter Alistair Ward, 25, second son of the Earl of Dudley.

In July it was Lord Ogilvy 26, son of the Earl of Airlie.

Urges Release Of Former Nazi General Meyer

Release of Kurt Meyer, former General of the German army who was sentenced to death and later to life imprisonment on war atrocity charges, and has been confined in Dorchester Penitentiary for the past five years, was advocated by Rev. H. E. D. Ashford, pastor of Trinity United Church and a chaplain in the Canadian Reserve Army in the course of his sermon last evening.

"In my own personal opinion," said Mr. Ashford, "I believe with all my heart that the man whom all the world is waiting for is languishing in Dorchester prison." He referred to a recent statement by Winston Churchill in which he called for a great International Force, fighting under one flag, and stated that Kurt Meyer should be under that flag leading a German Army.

Mr. Ashford interviewed Meyer on Sunday, August 6, and quoted Meyer as saying: "God sent me here and God will eventually lead me from here." Meyer had stated that he was married in the German Church, and one by one his five children had been baptized there.

He declared that he had taken vows at the altar not to bring them up as Nazis but in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. He also said that he had believed in the cause of Hitler with his whole heart, but that he now realizes that he had been mistaken in the worth of the cause for which he fought. Meyer also declares that he would not fight again for Germany, but that he would gladly lay down his life if the International World could be brought into being.

Mr. Ashford told his congregation that they "could not judge a man by what he is working for, but only by what he is living for." He declared that Meyer has "an amazing knowledge of the Russian mentality and of their technique of warfare."

Sixth Body Found On Cruise Ship

LAUZON, Que., Aug. 20 (CP)—The fire-wrecked Canada Steamship Lines cruise vessel, Quebec, late today yielded the remains of a sixth body, Col. Leon Lambert, Provincial Police Director for Quebec district, said tonight.

Col. Lambert said that the human remains were found amidship and that after preliminary examination here, they were found to be part of a skull and flesh and bones of the pelvic section. The remains will be shipped to Montreal for examination by medical expert, Dr. Rosario Fontaine.

Casualties In Korean Campaign

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—The United States army estimated Saturday that the North Korean Communists have lost 50,000 men so far in their invasion of South Korea. At the same time an army spokesman estimated that South Korean losses up to three weeks ago totalled 37,000.

The spokesman said round-ups of American casualties in Korea will not be announced hereafter until they have no value to the enemy. The last round-up of American casualties issued about two weeks ago, showed a total of 2,616.
