LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.

DEBATE ON THE ADDRESS.

Short Speeches by Hon Mr Campbell, Mr. Bell and Others.

FRIDAY, April 2.

House met at 3.30 p. m.

Hon. Mr. Campbell continued the debate on the Address. He compared the record of the Liberal-Conservative Government in the Public Works Department with that of the present administration, much to the disadvantage of the latter. As to the road machines, his experience of them had not been at all satisfactory. We never had such bad roads in the history of the country, i. e., in the hilly parts. Mr. Campbell then adverted to the lying statement that Messrs. Chalmers and Davison had brought in a debt of \$171,000, and pointed out that these gentlemen made no such statement. On the contrary, it was shown that the statement of the Auditor under the McLeod Administration was exactly correct. The bill of fare now placed on the table by the Government will involve an expenditure of nearly a million of dollars. This the Province cannot afford. We have no resources except farming, and the Government had better be warned in time not to impose additional heavy burdens upon the country.

Mr. Bell said that he had found Mr. Farquharson, when Acting Premier, extremely courteous—and us to give all the information possible and willing to enforce the Sectt Act. He had always taken the ground that the Government ought not to expend more money than had been voted by the House of Assembly at the previous session, and Mr. Farquharson was the only man who had the courage to stop expenditures when there was no vote of the Legislature authorizing them. He then reviewed the address. The wording of the paragraph referring to the bridge across the Hillsborough he found very obscure. It had been said that words were meant to conceal thoughts. But he was willing to suppose that the paragraph referred to meant something. He hoped that the bridge would be built in the near future. He wanted to see direct railway communication between Murray Harbor and Charlottetown. Mr. Davies had pledged himself to this, and he ought to stick to his pledge. He thought that the railway bridge could be utilized as a traffic bridge, and the cost would be only a few thousand dollars. As to cold storage, we have not before us the information upon which the proposition is based. Therefore it is impossible to discuss the question except in a cursory way. But before we go into a matter of this kind we must be sure that we can take advantage of a cold storage system. The system must be continuous. We must have cold storage on our railway and be certain that the Dominion Government will send us a steamer to take our produce in cold storage to the British Markets. This being secured, he was in favor of cold storage. He felt sure that the Government would deal in chemical fertilizers at a loss. As to the clause referring to our claims at Ottawa, if it means what it says, it means nothing. Hon. Messrs. Sullivan and Ferguson had obtained from the late Government \$20,000 in addition to our annual subsidy—a very tangible acknowledgement of our claims; and a year or two ago, the Hon. Mr. Ferguson in the Senate demonstrated conclusively, in the clearest manner, the righteousness of our claim upon the Dominion Government. We have also special claims upon the Dominion Government. Mr. Davies has a knowledge of these claims and he has influence. There can be no doubt that, in the near future, a considerable amount of additional subsidies will be granted to Prince Edward Island.

House went into Committee, Mr. Godkin in the chair. On the paragraph referring to cheese factories etc.—

Hon. Mr. Gordon called attention to the report that the Dominion Government had given notice that they would withdraw their patronage from our dairy industry on the first of next month. He desired to know what was intended by the Government?

Mr. McKinnon said that he, for his part, was perfectly sure that the Dominion Government would do what was right in respect to the dairy industry.

Mr. Shaw said that he had a letter from the Deputy Minister of Agriculture, which set forth that the Government would withdraw its patronage from the dairy industry of this Province on the last day of April. The cheese factories might be able to go on by themselves; but he feared that success would not attend our winter dairying if the Dominion Government withdrew its patronage this year, and that what had been done in the past would be rendered futile.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson said that the Provincial Government was not in possession of any information from the Dominion Government in respect to the matter. Patronage had been withdrawn from the cheese industry last year and nothing happened. It might be all right to withdraw altogether this year.

Mr. Shaw admitted that the Dominion Government had withdrawn from the cheese factories which were strong enough to go on alone; but it had continued to maintain with respect to winter dairying, which, except at Vernon River and a few other places, is not yet strong enough to go on without the assistance of the Government.

Mr. McKinnon expressed his pleasure concerning the paragraph referring to the Belfast and Murray Harbor Railway and the proposed bridge across the Hillsborough. He was strongly in favor of the railway and proud that the Liberal Party had taken the matter up. In this connection he declared that he had been slandered by

the press in respect to the Murray River meeting.

Hon. Mr. Campbell replied in a vigorous speech in which he reviewed the actions and pledges of the Liberal Party concerning the railway to Murray Harbor, and paid a tribute to the ability and perseverance with which Mr. Martin M. P. had advocated the construction of the proposed Southern Railway.

The address passed and the House adjourned until ten o'clock this forenoon.

SATURDAY, April 3.

House met this forenoon. The Address, as passed in committee was adopted and finally presented to His Honor the Lieutenant Governor.

INTERESTING NEWS NOTES SELECTED FOR THE EXAMINER.

Mr. Payne, of New York, a member of the Senate ways and means committee, says the Dingley bill is not framed in a spirit of hostility towards Canada. Its provisions will undoubtedly injure the Canadians, but that cannot be helped.

The Austrian Government has forbidden the exportation of 7,000,000 cartridges which were ordered from an Austrian firm by the Government of Greece.

A special loan exhibition of paintings will soon be opened in London to illustrate the progress of art during the Victorian reign.

The Australian Confederation Convention met in Adelaide last week, when a plan was drawn up, to be submitted to the several colonies.

The Lord Mayor of Dublin appeared before the bar of the House of Commons Monday and asked for redress of Ireland's financial conditions. Hon. E. Blake moved and John Redmond seconded a resolution for the relief of the taxpayers of the country.

A number of valuable historical papers stolen from the congressional library have been recovered in New York. The most valuable was Gen. Braddock's journal or orderly book, written by his aide, Col. George Washington, from January to June 1775.

Secretary Sherman has invited the maritime nations to send warships to participate in the ceremonies at New York on April 27th next, when the Grant monument will be formally delivered to the city of New York. The tomb of Gen. Grant was erected by voluntary subscriptions at Riverside Park.

The North American squadron is expected in Halifax from Bermuda early in May. The new cruiser Indefatigable will be seen in Halifax then for the first time. The squadron will be the most formidable that has been seen in Halifax harbor for many years.

The Toronto Globe publishes portraits of a number of Canada's elderly inhabitants, and among these is Sir Casimir Gzowski, who is eighty-four years of age. Those who have seen that nobly handsome man take part in a vice regal drawing room, standing through the ceremony with erect and martial figure, keen eye and every indication of health and activity, will admit that there are few men of sixty who can boast of faculties so well preserved.

A young widow in France, whose husband left her all his property on condition that she should forfeit it the whole, except dower, if she married again, was inclined to contract a new marriage, and prudently went to the local court to see if there were any escape. It upheld the will, but a higher court to which the question was taken then reversed the decision on novel grounds. The judges there said that co-habitation, being contrary to nature, was something which no man, alive or dead, had a right to impose, and that such an act, particularly in a country like France, where the population is stationary or waning, was contrary to public policy. Upon this the widow married; but it seems that she was too hasty after all, for relatives carried the case up to the supreme court, which ungalantly reaffirmed the original opinion.
