**Explosion Levels Garage, Pump House At Bedeque**

A tremendous explosion that demolished a combination garage and pump house, owned by Charles Green, Central Bedeque, rocked that area early last evening and sent residents scurrying to doors and windows to find out what had happened. No one was injured.

Mr. Green's son, Sydney, had been in the 16 by 45-foot garage and pump house, a few moments before the explosion, operating the electric pump which is used to pump water to the watering tubs at the barn. He had turned off the water, but left the pump running while he went to the barn. He had just entered the barn when the booming explosion occurred and on looking out he saw the roof of the garage-pumphouse heading towards the clouds. So tremendous was the force of the explosion that Mr. Green, who was away from home at the time, felt severe concussion in the house at which he was visiting, two miles from the scene of the blast.

A 200-gallon gas tank, which was located next to the electric

pump, had been filled with gas in the afternoon, but miraculously escaped the explosion, although the cap was blown off. Apparently fumes from the gas which seeped from this tank into the well in which the electric pump was located became ignited in some way causing the explosion. A small

KINGSTON, Jamaica (AP)—A dock strike tied up banana shipments from this British colony Wednesday. More than 100,000 stems of bananas were left unshipped at three docks.
