NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

CANADIAN.

BATHURST, N. B., Aug. 10.

The Roman Catholic chapel was completely destroyed by fire this forenoon. The fire originated in the steeple, probably from a small spark. At one time it appeared as if the fire would be widespread, but owing to the rain it was kept under control.

The church was insured for \$6,000—three thousand each in the Royal Canadian and Ottawa Agricultural. The loss over insurance will be about four thousand dollars.

The Governor General landed at Bathurst this afternoon from the steamer Druid. In company with several gentlemen he visited Messrs. Burns Adams & Co's mill and Mr. Thomas Temple's farm, and in the evening took a sail around the harbor.

HALIFAX, Aug. 10.

The steamer Camelia, from New York, bound to Dunkirk, arrived at this port this evening, towing the Anchor line steamer Acadia, from New York, bound to Glasgow, G. B., Acadia having shaft broken, loaded with grain and live stock. The Camelia came across Acadia twenty miles from Halifax and five hundred miles from New York. The captain of Acadia decided to have his ship towed to Halifax.

UNITED STATES.

GREENSBURG, Green Co., Ky., Aug. 10.

Felix Carbell shot and killed Jack Gowdy near the Bethel Church to-day, and Gowdy's friends shot and fatally stabbed Carbell.

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.

The burning hull of the oil laden bark Nietaux, this morning floated against the pier at Hunter's Point. Some of the American Lumber Company's lumber caught fire, spreading rapidly to six barges, one schooner and one ship, all of which are burning, besides a great quantity of lumber. Over ten acres of lumber yards are on fire on the south of Newton Creek, and several vessels on fire have drifted into East River towards Blackwell's Island. The fire is spreading in every direction, bidding fair to be the most destructive known here for years. The names of the vessels are not yet known.

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.

The grand Jury in their presentment in the Seawanhaka case denounce the overcrowding of excursion boats. Severe laws are advised for the punishment of careless or reckless pilots.

EUROPEAN.

BERLIN, Aug. 10.

Floods in the district of Ratibon have destroyed over twenty villages, and a loss of many millions of marks has been entailed by the total destruction of the harvest. Already 480 square miles are under water in Silesia.

MADRID, Aug. 10.

The Liberals are much annoyed at the immunity granted by the government to the Carlists and Ultramontanes lately. Their press in Madrid and the provincial towns openly proclaim the Carlists views and publish the pretender's letters. In the provincial elections for members of the Council General, for the first time in thirty years, Carlist candidates are canvassing.

VIENNA, Aug. 10.

A correspondent of the *Tagblatt* at Scutari says: The Albanian League constructed a mine under the Greek consulate at Pristrend, which was blown up.

GASTEIN, Aug. 10.

The Emperor William has started for Babelsberg via Ischt and Pessau.

PARIS, Aug. 10.

The final results of the elections for the Councils-General show 4,612 Republicans elected, and 405 Reactionists, being a gain of 300 seats for the Republicans.

LONDON, Aug. 10.

Baron Hicke, the expelled editor of the Anti-Republican paper *Le Tribune*, is the person who writes under the name of St. Patrick. He is a native of the United States and his ancestors emigrated from Ireland. The reactionary papers protest against his expulsion on the grounds that he has long resided in France and made a very generous use of his large fortune.

BERWICK-UPON-TWEED, Aug. 10.

The fast railway train between Edinburgh and London, known as the flying Scotchman has gone over the banks at Marshall Meadows, near this town. No particulars. Physicians have gone to the scene.
