—Enquires have been received at Ottawa respecting methods of lobster propagation in Canada, with a view to adopting similar operations in South Africa.

—Premier Greenway publishes a careful estimate of this year's wheat crop in the Northwest, placing the first-class high grade wheat at twenty-two million bushels, and lower grade at fifteen million.

—The State of Florida has passed a law making it a criminal offence for any individual or corporation to conduct within the State a school in which both white and black children are educated.

—Montreal Gazette: The Finance Minister will make arrangements for the withdrawal from circulation of the twenty-cent coins.

—There are more than one million and a quarter square miles of unexplored lands in Canada, according to the opinion of Dr. Dawson, director of the Geological Survey.

—Ever since La Patrie and Le Cultivateur attributed to offensive statements regarding the Oranienstein affair, the Conservative papers of Ontario have been vigorously and unjustly denounced by their Liberal contemporaries for maligning and misrepresenting the gifted leader.

—Mr. Gladstone has written a letter to the Temperance congress in which he says: "While profoundly sensible of the immense importance of the liquor question, I cannot pretend to have mastered its difficulties. I see it clearly in certain of its aspects, but as a whole it baffles me."

CHICAGO, Ill., October 7.—The negroes who crowned Queen chapel yesterday rose in a body to their feet in enforcement of an impassioned declaration by Rev. J. M. Townsend, the pastor. He had read to the audience from a morning newspaper clipping an account of the torturing of New South at Chattanooga. Then he said: "This must stop in a Christian land."

OTTAWA'S POPULATION.—Ottawa's population is put by the assessors at 43,500. These figures lift her from the fifth to the fourth place among the Canadian cities, Hamilton going down a notch. The Hamilton papers are not satisfied, and demand a recount.

MADRID, Oct. 8.—A despatch to the Imparcial from Havana says the gendarmes Alcedo left Madruga on Sept. 29, and furnished with grape shots the insurgents at several points along the coast. This manoeuvre prevented a projected attack by the rebels on Mayri.

The queen declares she will neither leave the capital nor the island to the French. Foreigners are unable to leave the city.

BALTIMORE, Md., October 7.—An electric locomotive, used in hauling freight trains through the belt line tunnel of the B. & O. R., demonstrated yesterday that its drawing power far exceeds the pretensions of its builders. Forty-four loaded freight cars, and the three steam locomotives not working, which had been used to haul heavy trains on the surface, were pulled up the heavy grade of the tunnel, a speed of 12 miles an hour being developed. The total weight of the train was 1,900 tons. The claim that this record was never equalled by a steam locomotive.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER

Supreme Court of Canada. OTTAWA, Oct. 9. The Quebec list of appeals was finished in the Supreme Court yesterday. To-day the defence in the fisheries case will be taken up. All the provinces, except P. E. Island and Manitoba, have filed factums. The question in dispute involves the jurisdiction over the fisheries of inland waters and the ownership of beds and foreshores of all inland lakes, streams and rivers.

Another Japanese Victory. SHANGHAI, Oct. 9. A despatch from Tokio says the Japanese forces on the Island of Formosa met and routed the Black Flag. The Black Flag leader, Gu Lin Yung, is surrounded on three sides by Japanese troops, and his capture and that of all his warriors is assured.

Quiet at Ottawa. OTTAWA, Oct. 9. For the past few days there has been a lull in political affairs due chiefly to Sir Julian Pauncefote's visit to Ottawa and his claims on the attention of the ministers. Now that he has gone cabinet sittings are resumed.

The Demers Trial Terminates. MONTREAL, Oct. 9. The Demers trial, which has been the longest in the history of the Montreal Criminal Court, terminated last evening by the jury failing to agree.

Lord Salisbury's Return. LONDON, Oct. 9. The Marquis of Salisbury has returned to London from Dieppe. The gravity of affairs at Constantinople hastened his return.

The Announcement Correct. PARIS, Oct. 9. The announcement that the government is in receipt of information of the capture of Antanarivo by the French is correct.
