organization of a club, 350 farmers by the end of the year had used this means for the breeding of about 1300 cattle. In many of this year eight other clubs were formed on the Island, and, he said, that with the proposed organization of six more clubs, this method of cattle breeding would be available to every farmer in this Province.

Mr. Walker said that since April of this year 1,700 cattle have been bred artificially, and estimated that the number for the whole of Prince Edward Island, by the end of this year, would be about 10,000.

In listing the advantages of the method he said it provided the opportunity for any farmer to breed to some of the best sire in Eastern Canada. He stressed the fact that inseminators are not government employees, but rather, are the employees of the club organization for which they work.

### Death Tuesday Of George Sudsbury At Summerside

The death occurred yesterday at the Prince County Hospital of Mr. George Sudsbury in his 84th year. The late Mr. Sudsbury was born in Summerside and was a well known and respected citizen of the town all his life. He was possessed of a keen wit and a great fund of information regarding the early life and history of Summerside.

By trade he was a blacksmith and for some years was employed with Hall Manufacturing Co. Ltd. in that capacity as well as with the firm of James A. MacNeill, farm machinery.

In former years he was an employee of the Town electric light plant, having worked in the old original plant on Fitzroy Street. Later he was employed by the town in the Street Department.

His wife predeceased him about 15 years ago and they had no family.

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### St. Anthony's Credit Union Annual Meeting

One of the big events of the surrounding districts of St. Anthony's Credit Union was their annual meeting. A well filled hall of members and visitors was called to order with the singing of O' Canada.

The first order of business was the roll call, followed by the minutes of the last annual meeting.

The President Mr. Gilbert Gaudet gave the report of the directors. He stated that regular meetings were held, and a number of special meetings. The welfare of the credit union, stated Mr. Gaudet, has always been our first concern, and we have tried to assist the members to the best of our ability.

FARMERS' BANK Mr. Gaudet commented on the Farmer's Bank at South Rustico which has been brought to the attention of the public by Dr. J.T. Croteau, who after a great amount of work and research has written a history of this bank. This bank was according to Dr. Croteau, the precursor of the credit union movement in North America. It was the smallest bank ever chartered in Canada, and was established in 1864 and existed for about thirty years, when it was absorbed into the banking system of Canada. Its operation was similar to the credit union we have today.

Mr. Gaudet said it was with regret that we learned of the sudden passing of Rev. M.E. Francis, who some years ago while he was director of the Extension Department of St. Dunstan's University assisted the credit unions in this Province.

Mr. Gaudet moved the adoption of his report, seconded by Henry J. Peters.

Mr. C.J. Gallant Treasurer gave the financial report, the report showed a savings of over \$30,000.

Mr. Gallant said, "Over the years we have built up public confidence in our credit union. It is important that this confidence be maintained, and, increased. Like any other business we can expect some failure from time to time, for one reason or another. As a representative at the annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Credit Union League held at Charlottetown on June 20th, I wish to give in a few words an outline of what took place."

Mr. Gallant gave in detail the activities of the League meeting. In conclusion Mr. Gallant stated that it was a pleasing experience when you can work with so many

individuals who are dedicated to the job of credit union, of which the late Roy Bergengen said, "the job of the credit union movement is to pave beyond doubt the practicality of the brotherhood of man." Through your co-operation we have tried to build up an organization of which you are proud. I know that you will continue to give to your officers the same loyal co-operation that you have given since the inception of the union." Mr. Gallant moved the adoption of his report, seconded by Mr. Jerry Peters.

54 LOANS Mr. Jerry Peters reported for the Credit Committee, he stated that over \$10,000 has been loaned during the year, and 54 applications approved. Mr. Peters moved the adoption of his report, seconded by Mr. Bruce Carruthers.

Mrs. Pearle Duncan reported for the Supervisory Committee. She explained the matters in which the books were audited. Mrs. Duncan moved the adoption of her report, seconded by Mr. Andrew Arsenault.

The election of officers was the next order of business. The new directors elected are Mr. Gilbert Gaudet re-nominated and Mr. Eugene Arsenault. Credit Committee Mr. Jerry Peters re-nominated and Mr. Vincent Gallant. Supervisory Committee Miss Bernice Gallant.

Mr. Lee J. Corcoran addressed the meeting. Mr. Corcoran was pleased with such a large attendance. He stated that rural Credit Unions did not advance as much as the city Credit Unions during the past year. He said we should build up our savings, to be used when needed. Credit Unions have a definite place in our community. Mr. Corcoran outlined the work at the League office.
