News Notes.

A telegram to a Spokane paper from Rossland reports that the Canada Western Gold Mining & Exploration Company, which is being formed among some local and outside mining men represented here by C. O'Brien Reddin & Co., has secured the Glasgow group, on Quartz Creek, about a mile from Ymir. The price is said to be about \$5500 spot cash and Messrs. Snider and McDonald were the lucky sellers. The group includes the Glasgow and the New Glasgow. A good six-foot ledge traverses the property, and so far as has been shown the ore body is about two feet wide. The ore is a smoky quartz carrying a peculiar cubical iron pyrites, very light in color. Surface assays have been obtained going \$20 in gold to the ton.

Latest advices from Australia indicate that the result of the present confederation movement may turn on the decision of New South Wales, where a considerable opposition has developed itself. Victoria, South Australia and Tasmania are counted certain to vote yes, their governments being agreed to accept the proposed constitution. West Australia seems to lack enthusiasm, but is counted on to accept if the other colonies do. In New South Wales, however, Mr. Lyons, the Opposition leader, is out against the measure, and is being supported by Mr. Watt, lately attorney-general in Mr. Reid's Cabinet. The principle has the support of many influential men of no party affiliations, and the leading newspapers are giving it their approval. It is hoped by the friends of federation that the next session of the Imperial Parliament will pass the act that will make union a reality.

The many Charlottetown friends of Mr. Richard J. Butcher will bear with regret of his sudden death at Providence, R. I. on Sunday. Appendicitis was the cause of Mr Butcher's demise. He was 40 years of age, and a son of the late Mark Butcher.

Previous to his departure from Lapeer Rev. F. C. Kelly was presented with a purse of \$250 by his parishioners and others. It is said that there are 300 Catholics in the regiment to which Father Kelly has been appointed chaplain, all of whom are Irish.

Lord Rosslyn, who since his bankruptcy has been trying to earn his living as an actor, has started a weekly journal called Scottish Life. His wife manages the woman's column, while his contributors include the Duchess of Sutherland, Lady Randolph Churchill, and the Marquis of Lorne.

Mr. Lebone, Minister of the Colonies in the French Cabinet, has tendered his resignation because he was defeated in his constituency. He seems to be more particular about some things in France than we are in Canada. There were two Ontario ministers defeated at the elections of two months ago. They did not resign, but are hanging on yet, to their portfolios, and their pay.

A Stuenbadic despatch to the Halifax Herald says: A E C Holland, who represented the 4th electoral district of Prince County, P. E. I. for 12 years continuously from 1873 in the provincial parliament, has been visiting Mrs F R Parker, of Stuenbadic. His wife, who died last July, was the youngest daughter by his first marriage of the late F R Parker. Mr Holland is one of P E I's able men and a strong supporter of the Conservative party.

TROUBLE IN NEWFOUNDLAND.

Friction Between Newfoundland and the French.

St. John's, Nfld., May 25.—Owing to the action of the Colonial Cabinet in enforcing the laws and prohibiting the export of bait from our waters to the island of St. Pierre, Miguelon, the French fishery on the Grand Banks this season is practically ruined. The French, in retaliation, demand that the Colonial Cabinet shall forbid some Newfoundlander vessels from fishing on the treaty coast, where the French have fishery rights.

On Tuesday the British Colonial office wired asking the Newfoundland Colonial Ministry to frame resolutions to that effect fearing to provoke trouble between France and Great Britain. The Newfoundland Cabinet declines to interfere, contending that this is a matter for inquiry by the Royal Commission recently requested to investigate the colony's affairs. It is expected that the Cabinet's decision will lead to severe friction between French and British warships along the treaty coast this season.
