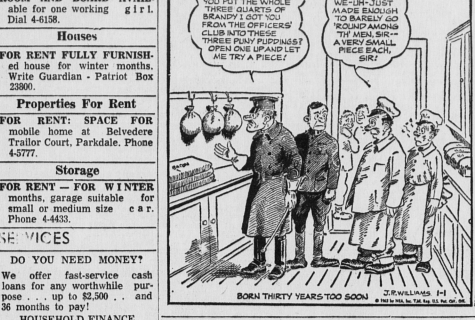

Public hearings will be held in the provinces of Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick on the following cities on the dates and at places indicated:  
Charlottetown—February 11-12, 1963—Court House, 10:00 a.m.  
Saint John—February 14-15, 1963—Court House, 10:00 a.m.

Briefs are invited from organizations, associations and individuals wishing to submit information and proposals relating to the activities of the various pilotage districts and to marine pilotage generally in Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick only. Public hearings covering the pilotage situation in the other two Atlantic provinces and elsewhere in Canada will also be held, the dates to be announced later.

The Commission has been asked to enquire into and report upon the problems relating to marine pilotage in Canada and to recommend the changes, if any, that should be made in the pilotage now prevailing, having regard to the determination, development and disposal of shipping and commerce, the interest of pilots, shippers, masters and the public generally. In particular the terms of reference of the Commission include:  
(3) the extent and nature of marine pilotage requirements, including compulsory pilotage, compulsory payment of pilotage dues and the granting of exemptions.  
(b) the duties, responsibilities and status of marine pilots.  
(c) the adequacy of the organizational structure provided in the Canada Shipping Act for the administration, regulation and financing of pilotage, taking into consideration such factors as the development of pilotage services, the determination and collection and disposal of pilotage dues, and the entry into service, technical standards, conduct, income, welfare and pensions arrangements of pilots.

Submissions (10:00) should be in writing and should reach the Secretary of the Royal Commission not later than the 28th of January, 1963. The Commission's hearings will be devoted to a review of the conclusions contained in the submissions, oral elaborations and arguments.

### RECORD DRY SPELL REPORT WINS TOP LIARS' AWARD

BURLINGTON, Wis. (AP)—An evaluation of a dry spell that somehow avoided the grimy eye of official weather observers has won for a Williamsport, Ohio, man the title of World Champion Liar of the Burlington Liars Club bestowed its annual accolade on Walter Lewis.

"The weather has so dry," went the Lewis account, "that when my canary bird wanted a drink, I had to pull up the well and run it through a winger."

President Otis C. Hulett of the Liars Club, reviewing the entry, indicated that the best U.S. liars of 1962 followed the classic form of the simple straightforward way, rather than the fancy filigreed falsehood that showed signs of setting the trend a decade ago.

Among the honorable mentions, for instance, was this from Harry L. Owen of Niles, Mich. "A friend of mine whom I was visiting bragged and bragged about his very good eyesight. I explained that my eyes are none too good but that my hearing is very good. To substantiate his claims, he asked me if I could see a church steeple located in the distance. My answer was 'yes' and he wanted to know if I could see the fly walking on the steeple. I told him I could not see the fly, but that I could hear its footsteps."

And Jack Hampton of Port Arthur, Texas, said that he has a top end watching TV westerns since a couple of old time bank robbers stuffed a vault with dynamite in one episode and the resulting explosion blew the picture tube clear out of his set.

### New Typsetting System Announced in Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A high speed system of setting newspaper type automatically, starting at the reporter's typewriter, has been announced by the Los Angeles Times and the Radio Corporation of America.

It is built around the computer which produces punched tape at 3,000 words a minute and feeds it into conventional typesetting machines.

Spokesmen for the Times, which began using the method Dec. 1, predicted great savings in money, manpower and time. They said any newspaper using 20 or more linesteaming machines could profit by it.

This is the essence: Reporters write their stories on electric typewriter equipped with a punched unit.

After the story is edited, edited typist punches up the corrections and changes.

**JUSTIFIES LINES**  
The computer then produces a finished tape which incorporates the editing, justifies the lines and sets the type properly. The tape is then fed into linesteaming machines that set it in type.

The "computer composition" concept was developed by Otis Booth, operations director of the Times.

He called it the first successful high-speed use of a computer in setting newspaper type.

The Radio computer will accept either typewritten news or advertising copy and corrects and proofreads the copy enough to fill a 24-inch newspaper column in 17 seconds.

As the new system of lines into general use, Booth said, a time saving of at least 40 per cent would be realized.

Newspapers have for several years used computers to operate typesetting machines but a skilled operator has been required to punch the tape. This system makes the writer the source of type.

The unique feature of the system, Booth said, is its ability to replace the operator. "It took a great deal of research and we feel this is a rather remarkable achievement."

The Times ultimately will require fewer than half the operators of 100 typesetters it now employs. Both estimated, there will be no need for operators being transferred to other duties in the composing room, he said.

"Times composing room employees are not represented by a union."

### Agriculture Minister Gives Review Of Butter Production

OTTAWA (CP)—As the year ends, there is enough butter in the country to supply all places across Canada to meet the needs of the whole country for eight or nine months.

The government last May began paying a consumer price subsidy of 12 cents per pound on butter. The price has increased but butter still had to compete with cheaper spreads, such as margarine.

The result was that butter production in 1962 was ahead of sales. This left Canada with year-end butter stocks of 197,000,000 pounds compared with 197,000,000 a year ago and 106,000,000 two years ago.

**CHEESE DEMAND UP**  
The final report reported a stronger demand for cheese but he said this can scarcely be seen in its reduction in the butter surplus. Only seven per cent of the total milk supply per head of cows in 1962 went into butter and 31 per cent for cream. The rest is kept on farms.

Reviewing the livestock market, Mr. Hamilton said last May's devaluation of the Canadian dollar and a stronger American dollar had reduced production returns from a feeder cattle. Prices were also forced up by small supplies of slaughter cattle.

An over-all shortage of beef led to higher retail prices. He said that the minister said that 1963 can be expected to bring a drop for both feeder and fed cattle, now that feed supplies are greatly improved.

With higher returns for pork, resulting from the increased beef and poultry prices, the final report also expected to show hog gradings to total about 160,000 more than in 1961.
