SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

The Newfoundland Difficulty.

PARIS, June 1. A bill has been deposited in the Chamber, backed by the Ministers of Finance, Marine and Commerce, extending the fishing bounty system until June 19th. The preamble complains of the aggravation of the difficulties of French fishermen by Newfoundland's restrictive legislation, and declares that national interests will be jeopardized unless the present situation is maintained. Deputy Delande will propose an amendment that the bill ought to be framed in such language as to compel Newfoundland to accept the arrangement between England and France. Deputy Delande declares France will never renounce fishing rights on the Great Banks.

Halifax News.

HALIFAX, May 31.

The fishery cruiser Vigilant, the first of the Dominion fleet to put to sea this year, sailed for the eastward to-day looking after American fishermen.

The sharp rise in flour and an increase of 20 per cent. in wages to journeymen has caused Halifax bakers to raise the price of bread to seven cents a loaf.

There is a great quantity of ice off the Newfoundland coast, and a steamer now due at Halifax is reported to be blockaded at Twillingate.

Twenty-five thousand dollars' worth of gold was mined in Nova Scotia during April.

The flagship Bellerophon, and other vessels of the North British fleet, are now due from Bermuda.

The steamer Westmeath, with the new Halifax-Bermuda cable on board, is due here Wednesday. She will take in 500 tons of coal, and immediately commence to lay the cable from this end.

Rev. D. P. Allison was ordained priest, and Mr. H. Beers was made a deacon by Bishop Courtney to-day.

The promoters of the English syndicate, which is negotiating for the purchase of all Canadian sugar refineries, is reported to have offered \$850,000 for the Nova Scotia Sugar Refinery, two-thirds cash and one-third stock, \$50,000 deposit to be made by August 1st, which is to be forfeited if the purchase is not completed by November 1st.

The Duke and Duchess of Connaught and suite will reach here to-morrow, at 10, per the Canadian Pacific. A congratulatory address will be presented, and a guard of honor furnished. They will be the guests of Sir George Stephen. In the afternoon, they will drive to the Mountain Park, returning for dinner in the evening. On Tuesday, there will be an excursion to St. Ann's, returning down the Lachine Rapids.

The passenger coach of the train which went through the draw bridge at Oakland Friday was hauled up on the beach Saturday afternoon, but no bodies were found, and it is now believed all bodies have been recovered. Thirteen have been found.

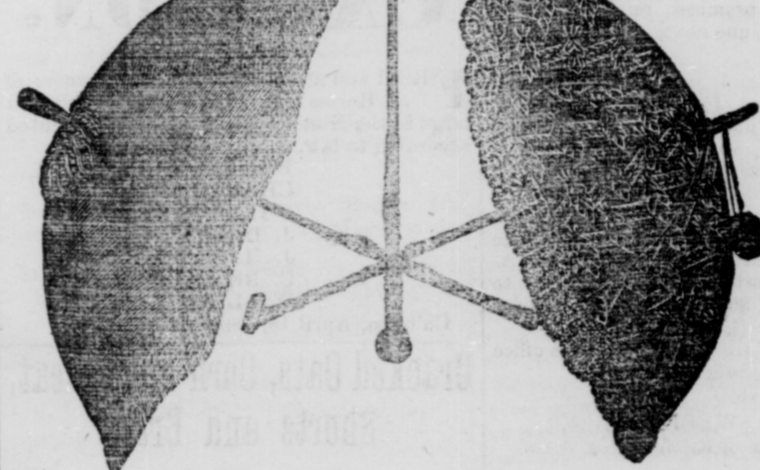
